N. Rustico Blood Clinic Scheduled For Monday

Residents in the North Rustico area will have this year's opportunity to help keep the province's blood bank well filled when the annual Red Cross blood donor clinic for this locality takes place at Stella Marie hall on Monday evening, August 9, from 8 until 10 p.m.

The North Rustico branch of the Royal Canadian Legion is again sponsoring this Red Cross clinic with Bert Blaquiere heading the committee in charge which has an objective of 150 donors to meet.

Attendance at the clinics held at North Rustico during the past couple of years has dropped considerably below the 150 quota, according to Red Cross officials, who stated that the Legion committee at North Rustico is making every effort to exceed

the quota this year by stressing the importance of an all-out attendance of former donors, as well as of new donors and summer visitors.

On Monday, August 9, residents in districts surrounding Hunter River and North Rustico will have a choice of donating their blood at one centre or the other. They may boost the numbers at Central Queen's Regional High School at Hunter River in the afternoon between 3 and 5, or at Stella Marie hall in North Rustico between 8 and 10 in the evening.

Assisting the North Rustico Legion blood donor committee with the preparations for, and the carrying out of the clinic there, are representatives of their Legion Ladies' Auxiliary, as well as the local Women's Institutes and CWL's who give their enthusiastic co-operation to this project.

Basin Search For Pair Is Called Off

TRURO, N.S. (CP) — A search for the occupants of a 15-foot boat found overturned in Minas Basin Sunday morning will not continue today, an RCMP spokesman said here Tuesday.

Believed drowned are Donald Thompson and T. N. Brown, both of Amherst. The two failed to return home from a weekend fishing trip.

A car in which the two men were travelling was found at Economy Point on the basin's north shore.

An RCMP helicopter spotted their overturned boat Sunday about three miles north of Walton, N.S. The outboard-powered, homemade craft was identified as belonging to Thompson.

Woman Hurt In City Crash

A small car and a station wagon owned by the Canada Department of Transport were in collision around 11.30 last evening at the corner of Great George Street and Fitzroy Street.

A lady passenger in the car received an injury to her foot and slight lacerations to her head. There were three people in each vehicle and all the others appeared to escape with no injuries.

The station wagon was badly damaged around the right rear fender. The front section of the small car was heavily damaged. City police were on the scene.

Fundy Park Bridge Stirs Criticism Of Governments

MONCTON (CP) — Both federal and provincial governments should be "severely criticized" for allowing the condition of the Fundy National Park bridge to deteriorate, T. M. Bell Progressive Conservative member of Parliament for St. John's, said Tuesday.

Mr. Bell was commenting on reports of federal engineers that a covered bridge linking the Albert County village of Alma and the national park was "unsafe, unsuitable and liable to collapse."

Mr. Bell deplored the fact the report was issued at the peak of the summer tourist season and said with the federal and provincial governments spending money on tourist promotion, including Fundy Park, both should be criticized for allowing the situation to arise.

The heavily travelled bridge provides one of the main entries and exits to the park. Mr. Bell said he understood repairs would be started to the structure immediately.

When the report was made public Friday, one engineer said the bridge had been set for some time.

A spokesman for the provincial public works department said Tuesday a departmental official was on the site inspecting the bridge and conferring with federal officials.

City Rainfall Totals .06 In.

The Charlottetown Radio Range reported that as of 10 o'clock last night there had been .06 of an inch of precipitation in the last 24-hour period.

This figure is applicable to the Charlottetown area only. There could have been more or less than this amount in other regions of the province, it was explained.

Arson Is Suspected In Two Fires

TRENTON, N.S. (CP) — Police said here Tuesday they believe a fire that earlier in the day destroyed the home of a Trenton family of eight was set by arsonists.

A police spokesman said they had "an idea" who might have set the blaze, but it was impossible to prove anything because no one was caught at the scene. He said there are indications "a personal grudge" is involved.

Less than two weeks ago the two-storey home of truck driver George Huggins and his family of seven was heavily damaged by fire. Tuesday morning the home and all its contents were destroyed. Police said there are indications gasoline was poured on the home before both fires.

Mr. and Mrs. Huggins and their children ranging in age from eight to 17 years, have moved to nearby Green Hill, where they have rented a house.

Mayor W. J. Cox Off To Montreal

Mayor Walter J. Cox left by plane last night for Montreal where he will attend the funeral today of George S. Mooney, executive director of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities, who died Sunday. After the funeral an executive meeting is scheduled to determine a successor to Mr. Mooney. Mayor Cox will return early Thursday morning.

up emotions and perhaps cause more violence."

ASKS JOHNSON'S AID

State Lieutenant-Governor Peter Zack Geer sent a telegram to President Johnson asking him to use his influence to end the demonstrations.

Mayor T. Griffin Walker of Amherst urged residents to stay off the streets at night and not to congregate in groups. He also called for an end to demonstrations.

"It is sad that peace-loving citizens must be kept from performing such routine chores as shopping because of a feeling of fear," he declared.

Negro leaders, however, said there would be no let-up in picketing and marches.

Uneasiness increased when county officials reported that the sale of permits to carry pistols had increased rapidly since Whitley was killed. All applicants were white.

Negroes started demonstrating after the arrest July 20 of four Negro women who tried to vote in a line for white persons only during a county justice of the peace election.
