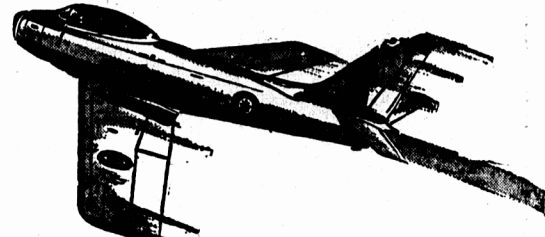

"KIM" MOVIE MADE IN EXOTIC INDIA!

The adventure, excitement and romance of one of the world's most mysterious lands, India, comes to the screen in Rudyard Kipling's "Kim," from the Pen of a man who knew that country best.
