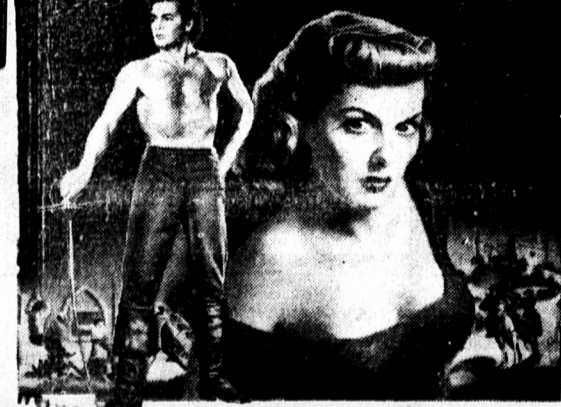

Six Aga Khan Robbers Guilty

AIX-EN-PROVENCE, France. (AP)—Six of the 12 men on trial for engineering the \$850,000 jewelry robbery of the Aga Khan and the beautiful Bezum four years ago were found guilty Saturday.

They were sentenced to prison terms ranging from four to 10 years. Three other defendants, among them a colorful, swashbuckling wartime hero who claims to be Winston Churchill's godson, were acquitted by a seven-man French jury. No decision was announced immediately on the fate of three others tried in absentia.

The acquitted war hero, George Lindsay Watson, denied vehemently during the 12-day trial that he was finger man in the sensational robbery.

Much of the loot grabbed from the Aga Khan's party in the 1949 daring daylight holdup on the French Riviera has been recovered.

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Diet Mania In United States

NEW YORK, (AP)—You scarcely can walk a city block or a country mile in the United States these days without seeing signs of the diet mania which currently has some 40,000,000 Americans in its grasp.

Where are headquarters for this campaign against the waistline? A supermarket, or any kind of market, without a special diet shelf is a rarity. You can buy "diet" items—meaning low-calorie items—which include such unlikely luxuries as pancake syrup, chocolate pudding, bread, soft drinks and even borscht.

Dieting is assuming such proportions that even producers of non-dieting items are taking special pains to boast about their low-calorie contents. Sales of thinning aids are climbing steadily. There's a demand for dieting schedules. A low-calorie cookbook climbed to best-seller status. U. S. Government publications on how to lose weight are in demand.

The dieting rage is not confined to women, traditionally the sex primarily interested in figure-keeping. A diet book aimed specifically at chubby gentlemen had a recent wide sale.

Island Odds And Ends

A native of Charlottetown and a long-time resident of the city, but now residing in Halifax, Mr. Thomas Morris is paying his yearly visit to his birthplace. Historically minded, Mr. Morris probably knows the story of old Charlottetown as accurately and minutely as any Islander living. To him every street in town recalls some association with the past or some incident of the long ago.

After shaking hands with some old friends near the Bank of Commerce on Saturday, he glanced across the street at Hughes' Drug Store corner, and remarked, "There has been a drug store on that corner since 1812; I think I have an old newspaper record to prove it." Mr. Morris can also point out Charlottetown's first hotel, still standing in part as a rebuilt private residence on the south side of Connaught Square. He can pin-point dozens of other historical sites in the city, with equal ease and give a commentary on the part played in the story of old Charlottetown.

We do not know whether Mr. Morris has recorded any of this most interesting data, and if not it would undoubtedly be of value to Charlottetown if he was induced to commit it to paper. Mr. Morris was long associated with the firm of J. & T. Morris, in this city.

In reverting to the personal for this particular tale your correspondent offers no apology. I was on the spot when the story was chronicled and the eyewitness method of telling it seems the best.

With two friends, Mr. Stanley Bryant, Dominion Government auditor and "Bill" Phillips, son of the late H. J., I was fishing Seal River (east of Cardigan) on an evening three weeks ago. We combed the stream from the bridge outward toward the Cardigan river on both sides, from 6.30 to 7.30 without landing anything bigger than a smelt. With nothing to lose, we decided to move upstream more or less on an exploratory mission. The tide was more than half high. Bryant moved faster than Bill and me and rounded the bend quickly a couple of hundred yards above the bridge. I reached the bend slowly, casting as I went and paused there momentarily and glanced farther up the stream to locate Bryant, who was about 150 yards away. A moment later he yelled excitedly and when I looked his way again he was backing towards shore with a fish on his line jumping four or five feet in the air in frantic efforts to escape.

"Come on up," he said, "the place is alive with them!" When I reached him he had the fish landed and because he had never seen a Rainbow before asked me what it was. I had seen some at Keefer's Lake and was able to pronounce it a Steelhead.

Army Board Says No Negligence In Death Of Soldier

OTTAWA, (CP)—Army headquarters said Sunday there is nothing to indicate that Lieut. Frederick Joseph Burke of Regina, who died Thursday after undergoing punishment at Petawawa military camp, received anything but normal treatment.

The army said a board of inquiry has found there was no negligence or lack of proper consideration on the part of the staff of the detention barracks.

Burke collapsed after a 20-minute exercise on the Petawawa camp obstacle course while serving seven days' detention for being absent without leave. He died in camp hospital a short time later.

A post mortem showed that Burke died from "asphyxia caused by bilateral pneumonia." George Burke, father of the 29-year-old soldier, said his son was stripped of his corporal's stripes and given seven days' detention after he took ill and overstayed his leave on a relative's farm near Ottawa.

The army said the seven days' detention was quite regular for being absent without leave. Before going to the detention barracks, he was examined by a medical officer and was certified as fit.

At no time did Burke complain of any disability or illness, the army said.

The RCMP have taken over the investigation. An inquest will be held probably next month.
