

# Status of Photo Club Still up in Air

Conflicts continue between the Student Union Budget Committee (headed by Treasurer Ray Shalala) and the U.P.E.I. Photo Club. Formerly chaired by Mark Rock. At least one meeting took place last week with members of the Photo Club and Mr. Shalala trying to make a settlement. The major problem is obviously, the Photo Club's budget. The budget committee was offering \$1400 to go with \$1000 they felt the Photo Club could earn on their own. Mark Rock says that the club will accept an absolute minimum of roughly \$2100, excluding the unreasonably and unobtainable \$1000 extra income. Mr. Rock sees

little hope of settling this conflict and, regardless of how things turn out, will in no way take back his former position as chairman if it is offered to him. One attempt at a solution to the dispute was an agreement of responsibilities proposed by Ray Shalala. The Photo Club members have expressed interest but certainly not complete endorsement of the proposal.

Judging from the length of time taken up, the major item of business appeared to be the dates of the Winter Carnival.

Woozy MacDonald suggested that it be held Feb 25-29 and Bruce MacDonald, Carnival Chairman-to-be suggested January 27-31. After much discussion on the merits of the two sets of dates, Council finally voted to have the Carnival in February.

With this result, Bruce MacDonald refused to take the job, whereupon the whole question was opened again with - with a bonus, everyone wanted to know if we could get a new chairman.

Finally Council came up with the rather interesting result that accepted Bruce's dates while re-opening the position of Carnival Chairman. Apparently the latter was done with the purpose of attempting to get a chairman who would accept the other set of dates.

In the course of the above discussion, it was brought out that the campus police have, at times, been less

than diligent in the conduct of their duties. At last week's Pig the doors were left open and the lights on. Further several Councillors had their own little story to present of drunkenness on the job, sleeping on the job, etc. One brought up the case of a policeman who could not perform his duties since no one would listen to him and so had to ask other members of the force to do his duties for him.

On this issue Council decided to have Bill Chandler,

Student Union Comptroller, talk to Ted Crockett, Chief of the Campus Police, and report back to the next meeting about their little tete-a-tete.

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## Senate Tenure Decisions

On Thursday Nov. 13, the Tenure Committee of the U.P.E.I. Senate released its decisions as to who should be accepted and rejected for Tenure. Of ten applicants, six were accepted, one was rejected and three were deferred for a two-year period.

The last is a new recommendation. Previously all candidates had been either accepted or rejected. There is some question as to whether or not the Committee had overstepped its bounds in taking this unprecedented move. Apparently there is also some doubt as to what exactly a deferral is, especially in the minds of the three applicants who were given deferred status.
