British, Russians Fail In Talks On Viet Nam

MOCOW (Reuters)—British Foreign Minister Michael Stewart and his Soviet counterpart, Andrei Gromyko, discussed Viet Nam Wednesday but failed to bring the crisis nearer the negotiating table.

British sources said the Soviet minister insisted in their talks that Russia's first condition on Viet Nam is for the United States to stop bombing North Viet Nam.

He criticized Britain for supporting the U.S. and said Washington bears the entire responsibility for the war.

Gromyko said Russia fully supports a plan put forward by North Vietnamese Premier Pham Van Dong calling for American withdrawal from Viet Nam.

Stewart proposed a new conference, guarantees for South and North Viet Nam against outside aggression, assurances by both not to interfere in each other's affairs and agreement to decide the future set-up in Viet Nam by free choice of its people.

PUTS OUT FEELERS
British sources said Stewart, who arrived Monday on a five-day visit, still is trying to find out whether the Communists think a peace conference could be held if U.S. bombings are halted.

The talk on Viet Nam in Gromyko's office showed both sides far apart on major world issues.

The Viet Nam discussion was part of a meeting dealing mainly with European security. British sources said Gromyko emphatically rejected a renewed suggestion by Stewart that the Soviet Union, Britain, the U.S. and France should discuss the problem of German reunification.

He insisted this is outside the competence of the wartime allies and should be settled by the two German states within the framework of a disarmed Germany.

The British minister was quoted as saying nothing should be done which could make German reunification more difficult or change the military balance in Europe.

Stewart revived a 1959 Western plan for Britain, the U.S.,

Forest Fires Above Average

OTTAWA (CP)—Number of fires in Canada's forests was above average for the 1965 fire season but acreage lost was the second lowest in the last 37 years.

Forestry department estimates for the season ending Oct. 31 list 7,067 fires compared to the 1955-64 total of 6,735.

But only 544,000 acres were burned over, compared to the 10-year average of more than 2,900,000 a year. Loss in 1964 was 2,900,000 acres.

Lowest recorded loss since 1928 was in 1963 when 470,000 acres were lost to fires in the April 1-Oct. 31 season.

Biggest acreage reduction this year was in the Yukon and Northwest Territories where 199 fires damaged 30,000 acres.
