Schreiner Warns Steyn

CAPE TOWN, Nov 23.—Prime Minister Schreiner's letter to President Steyn, of the Orange Free State, which was being carried by Mr. Collett, a correspondent, who was arrested by the Boer commandant in the Burchardorp hills, is worded very strongly. In it Mr. Schreiner informs President Steyn that he will be held personally responsible with his life for the proclamation in the annexed districts of Cape Colony, resulting in the forced enlistment of royal colonists in the Boer ranks.

Sir Alfred Milner, Governor of Cape Colony, regards it as imperative to prevent the continuance of such enlistments and the impending British attack on Colesburg was prompted by his determination to put an end to the commandeering of British subjects.

Mr. Schreiner is loyally co-operating with the Governor.

Some Points About Marks.

LONDON, Nov 23.—The Daily Mail's Cape Town correspondent says the spy Marks, whose life is so highly valued by the Boers, formerly kept a restaurant in Cape Town, and was a witness at the trial of O'Donnell, who shot Carey, the informer in the Phcenix park murders. It also says that among the Boer wounded just arrived is included the athlete Bigaut, who competed in the running championships in England last year.

Light Horse Men Grow Romantic

LONDON, Nov 22.—The recently raised corps of South African Light Horse, it seems, has taken a romantic turn, and decided to emulate the knights of old and wear feathers in their hats. When the entire sock of Cape Town stores was depleted of plumes the women wrecked their own bonnets to supply enough to go around.

Victoria Cross for Hamilton.

LONDON, Nov 23.—The Manchester Guardian states that Colonel Ian Hamilton has been recommended for the Victoria Cross for his bravery in the fighting at Elandslaagte.

Wheat in Australia.

SYDNEY, N S W., Nov 23.—The government statistician announces that reports received regarding the present season's wheat yield indicate that it will be double that of last year.

HE WAS SURPRISED.—The Maritime Merchants reports that a visitor from Toronto to Summerside was recently shown the store and warehouse of Mr. R. T. Holman. He was much surprised at the immensity of the stock carried by that firm. Speaking to the Merchant about it, he spoke of the thousand of pounds of wool which were stored away and which had appreciated to the extent of several cents a pound since it was bought.

WANTS A DIVORCE.—Mrs. Nettie Smith, of Topeka, has filed a suit for divorce against her husband, J. P. Smith on the ground that he goes to bed with his boots on. On the face of it this seems to be very good ground indeed. But there may be extenuating circumstances, possibly Mrs. Smith is troubled with cold feet.

PROVINCIALISTS IN BOSTON.—The Prince Edward Island Club, of Boston, composed of P. E. Islanders, is to have its annual ball in February next at Paul Revere Hall.
