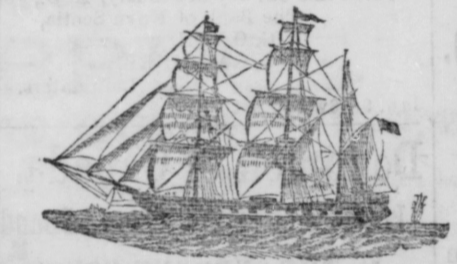
TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Shipwrecked. SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 23. The facts are learned to-day of a number of disasters in the South Pacific Islands. The schr. Navigator was struck by a heavy sea and became a total loss, while bound from Apia to another Samoan port. Crew and seven passengers saved. Vessel valued at \$10,000. The schr. Darmatila has been discovered bottom up in the Hawaiian channel. She had a crew of four men and one passenger. All are believed to have been lost. The vessel was valued at \$65,000, and insured for \$40,000. On January 23, the steamer Planter struck on a rock near the Sandwich Islands and was completely wrecked. No lives lost. She was valued at \$75,000. Chamberlain on the Workingman. LONDON, Feb. 23. Joseph Chamberlain, the President of the Local Government Board, was visited to-day by a deputation of unemployed workmen, who stated their grievances, and asked what the Government meant to do to relieve the prevailing distress. Chamberlain, in his reply, deprecated riots, and all similar forms of disturbances to manifest the needs of help. He said he was opposed to emigration as a means of relief, unless distress was chronic. He added that he hoped the Government would soon be able to establish the British laborer upon the soil he tilled. The Fire in Marine and Fisheries Department. OTTAWA, Feb. 23. S. J. Jenkins, Hon. Mr. Foster's Private Secretary, received much praise for his prompt measures in connection with the fire in the Easton block. The damage done is estimated at between 4000 and 5000 dollars. No papers or documents were destroyed. It is likely either Mr. Everett or Dr. Baker will move the answer to the address in the Commons. Members are beginning to arrive. Greece Yields to the Powers. LONDON, Feb. 23. Lord Roseberry, Foreign Secretary, has received from Sir Horace Rumbold, British Minister at Athens, a telegram announcing the formal submission of Greece, and stating that Premier Delagannis will prepare a protest to the Powers that Greece submits only to force. Fire in Yokohama. SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 23. A fire in Yokohama on February 8th destroyed the Windsor Hotel and several other buildings. Total loss, \$100,000; insurance, \$60,000. Armistice Renewed. LONDON, Feb. 23. The armistice between Servia and Bulgaria will be prolonged. Servia has withdrawn her troops from Pirot to Nisch. Weather Bulletin. 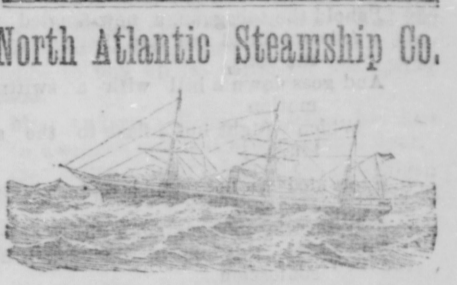
