WILL NOT GRANT AN INVESTIGATION

Government Goes Back on Their Promise.

SIFTON'S COURAGE OF THE OTHER DAY HAS VANISHED.

He Now Claims That the Yukon Charges are not Definite.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, June 30.—Mr. Sifton and his colleagues will not give Sir Charles Hibbert his commission of inquiry. The Minister of the Interior spoke at considerable length arguing that the charges are not sufficiently definite to require an investigation in the way intended.

Mr. Clark Wallace, in the course of his speech said that the courage with which Mr. Sifton made his challenge to Sir Charles Hibbert, and his offer to give him all the investigation he wanted, seemed to have altogether vanished.

A few months ago he was going to make Sir Charles sorry if he ventured to make his charges, but now he was himself finding a means of escape.

Mr. Wallace closed by stating that though the Government has refused a court of inquiry there was another court, another jury, before whom an appeal would be taken. The appeal would be from this Government and this court to the people of Canada.

The Premier, I spoke vehemently, assailing Sir Hibbert Tupper, and was replied to by Mr. Foster who made a splendid speech.

In closing his enumeration of offences in the Yukon, Mr. Foster said that in the position the Government had taken it was standing behind all this corruption, blackmail and stealing.

In view of this position, to say nothing of the record the Mercier Government of Quebec, and some other grit ministers, Foster could not but agree that the fact that the Liberals were in power was not a positive guarantee that the fair name of Canada was safe.

Sir Louis Davies followed.

NOVA SCOTIA SHIP.

Total Loss of the Selkirk at the Philippines.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 30.—News of the total loss of the ship Selkirk in the Philippine Islands was brought from the orient by the steamer Rio De Janeiro.

SUPREME COURT.

FRIDAY, June 30.

The cases of Rose Ann Simpeu against Robertson and Thompson, which began yesterday afternoon are still before the court. The actions are against them as sureties on a sheriff's bond Stewart, Q. C., for plaintiff; M. McLeod, Q. C., for defendant.

Kilbride vs. Long and Campbell.—Action for mal practice tried at Summerside when a verdict was found for the plaintiff for \$500 damages. Stewart, Q. C., for defendant. Long moved for a rule nisi for a non suit or new trial. The court granted a rule nisi returnable next Michaelmas term on the ground that there was no joint liability and that the verdict was contrary to and against the weight of evidence.

Lea and wife vs. Simmonds. Tried at Summerside, when plaintiff got a verdict. McQuarrie for defendant obtained a rule nisi for a non suit on the ground of the misjoinder of plaintiff. Rule returnable in four days. The trial of the criminal cases will probably begin on Monday.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—So the “Business is Business” government is squirming again under the weight of the Yukon charges.

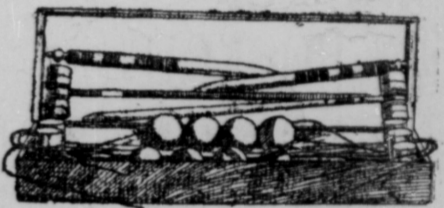
