ALWAYS RELIABLE
Land Tax, 1897

Owners of property are reminded
that by the recent amendment to the
Assessment Act, the system of valu-
ing property for Land Tax has been
changed, and it is necessary that new
valuations and declarations be made
this year. Such declarations to be
made by the owner, occupier or agent,
before the Provincial Treasurer or
Deputy Receiver of the district.

In valuing property the value of
the buildings must be included.
The rate of tax for 1897 is one
fifth of one per cent., or 20c on every
\$100 of valuation.

The tax will be due on the 1st Dec-
ember. A discount of 5 per cent.
will be allowed if paid on or before
the 15th Nov., 1897.

THE NEWS IN SHORT METRE.

Items of Interest Folded Down For More
Easy Reading.

The smuggling of Chinamen from Mon-
treal in the United States is being vigor-
ously pursued.

Lyman B. Smith, once a prominent
politician of New York State, died a pauper
at Buffalo, and his remains were sent to
Cornell University for dissection.

Georgia State legislature which has been
considering a bill to abolish football playing
in Georgia is now considering another bill
to legalize prize fighting in that State.

It is stated that New York is to be fort-
ified with what are known as Gruson
turrets a German fortification controlled by
the Krupp. The turrets will be placed
at the entrance to New York harbor.

The Pope has despatched two special
agents to convey instructions to the French
electors, enjoining them to frankly accept
the republic and to oppose monarchical
aspirations in the approaching elections.

Mrs Anna S. Gould is going to Alaska
as the chaperone of about sixty widows
and bachelor maidens. In reply to a
question of a reporter as to what they
intended to do when they got there, Mrs
Gould stated that they were going to do
good and make money.

Mr. Van Wyck, the newly-elected Mayor
of Greater New York, has filed a statement
of his election expenses, and the grand
total is \$158,755. If this results in remov-
ing the farce of election expenses returns
from the boards it will not have been in
vain.

Chulalongkorn, of Siam, and Menelik, of
Abyssinia, have been named Knights
Grand Cross of St. Michael and St. George,
and the chivalric equals of Sir Wilfrid
Laurier, Sir Oliver Mowat and Sir Richard
Cartright. These are distinguished men of
many colors bracketed for fame.

It transpires that Laurier's visit to
Washington was the outcome of the
personal invitation of General J. W.
Foster, ex-secretary of state for the United
States, who is understood to be acting at
McKinley's instigation. The object is to
reach a basis of agreement on all matters
now at issue between the two countries.

At Luchow, in Germany, 129 fathers
have been fined one mark a piece for al-
lowing their children under ten years of age
to dance at the harvest festival of a village
near by. The village par-ot objected to the
dancing and reported the case to the police.
It was discovered, however, that his child-
ren had danced, too, and he was fined with
the rest.

An express driver in Chicago, who was
locked up overnight for driving his horse
and delivery wagon in a funeral procession
against the protestations of the mourners,
pleaded in the morning that his horse once
belonged to an undertaker, and he could
not overcome the brute influence of old
associations. He was discharged
without fine.

At the meeting at New York of the
National Sound Money League reports
were read from Nebraska and Arkansas to
the effect that free silver ideas were as
strong there as ever among the electors.
The elections of the 2nd November are not
the only evidences visible that Bryanism
is still confounded with statesmanship in a
large section of the United States.

Mail and Empire: Advices from Wash-
ington do not say that Sir Wilfrid took the
Cobden medal with him. He apparently
chose the wiser course and left it at home.

envy and jealousy.

St. John Sun: Japan and Holland are
not in the British Empire. But they have
been admitted to preferential trade
treatment by the Canadian government in
addition to the long list of foreign countries
previously admitted. The British West
Indies are not included in the favored list.
They are not foreign countries.

Toronto Globe: "While Canada is being
advised so extensively in the mother-
land it might be not inappropriate to tell
John Bull that the high standard of
comfort in the Dominion is due in some
measure at least to the temperate habits
of the people. Temperance is just as truly
a national asset to be reckoned in dollars
and cents as is our wealth of virgin soil or
our gold fields."

St. John Sun: It is stated that Mr. A.
R. McDonald is to be superintendent of the
Drammond Counties end of the Inter-
colonial railway. There is some inter-
esting history about Mr. McDonald if he is
the same man who was formerly district
superintendent stationed at Riviere Du
Loup. This latter official was one of the
first men attacked after the change of
government. He was accused of partizan-
ship and all sorts of crimes. A commis-
sioner was sent to investigate and convict
him in the usual way. It turned out,
however, that the accused had influential
friends in the grip camp who came to his
rescue. They fought with the accusers
over the case and the government did not
know what to do. Of course the commis-
sioner, like the others, was expected to
carry out the desires of his employers.
The quarrel resulted in the suspension of
the official on full pay. In that happy
position he has continued until now, when
perhaps an opportunity has occurred to
provide a place for the office seeker with-
out turning Mr. McDonald adrift.

the relief of fishermen who failed of their
catch during the past season.

CITY TAXES.—The city collector today
made application to Stipendiary Magistrate
Hazard for judgment against persons who
have not paid their real estate taxes for
1896. The Magistrate granted the
application and ordered executions to
issue. Citizens desirous of having their
names struck off the defaulters list, before
advertising are requested to pay at once.

HIGH TIDES AT POINT DU CHENE.—The
tides at Point du Chene, on Wednesday
and Thursday, were higher than they have
been for years. The extension from the
station proper to the end of the pier, where
the steamers arrive, was submerged by
water and the tracks were considerably
disarranged as a result. The track is also
considerably undermined and a gang of
men and teams are engaged at work repair-
ing the damage done.

ISLANDER MARRIED.—A very interesting
event took place at the residence of Mr.
Chesley Steeve, Lower Covedale, Nov. 10th,
when his daughter Hattie was united in
marriage to Mr. Edward Matthews of P.
E. Island. The ceremony was performed
by the Rev. Mr. Allan of Hillsboro, after
which about 60 guests sat down to a
sumptuous repast. The bride looked
charming in brown poplin, trimmed with
pearl and silk, and carried a lovely bouquet
of chrysanthemums. The presents were
both costly and numerous. The guests
indulged in games and dancing until the
week small hours.—Moncton Times.

A HALIFAX INCIDENT.—The Halifax
Recorder says: A peculiar scene was
witnessed in a north end bar room early
Saturday evening. It appears that a man
after leaving work and while on his way
home with his wages called in at a saloon
which he frequently patronized and called
for a pint of beer. While he was drinking
it a woman walked in and after touching
him on the arm said, "Well are you going
to give me a glass also?" The man looked
as if he had lost his senses. The woman,
who was his wife asked him why he did
not answer? Still no reply. The woman
then remarked that they had had enough
time to live without him throwing away
his money on beer. The husband did not
make any reply, and with his head down
left with his wife.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon, the case
of William E. Barron, charged with wilful
and corrupt perjury, was first on the
docket. Barron was not in court when his
name was called, however, and the Magis-
trate made the usual endorsement on the
recognizance entered upon by him and his
surety and ordered it to be forwarded to
the proper officers for collection.

was convicted and a fine of \$5 or 30 days
was imposed.

interior.
