Latest News Notes.

Eureka destroyed the business portion of Eureka, Ark., on the 22nd. Loss, \$20,000; very little insurance.

A French syndicate is engaged in the gigantic scheme of building a railway through Brazil, Paraguay and Bolivia to the Pacific coast. The cost will be \$200,000,000.

The Journal de St. Petersburg denies that a secret treaty has been entered into between Corea and Russia. It admits that Corea granted to Russia facilities for trade across the frontier.

The Lamoine Packing Co.'s sardine factory, at Ellsworth, Me., with all its contents, was destroyed by fire, on Friday morning. The fire is supposed to have originated from spontaneous combustion.

It is announced that John O'Connor, Finerty, Sheehy, Hayden, Condon, Patrick, O'Brien and Yanner, all members of the national party, in the House of Commons, will be prosecuted for intimidating renters of evicted farms.

The New York World's Indianapolis correspondent telegraphs an interview with General Harrison, in which the latter denies the truth of published reports of alleged statements made by him concerning the annexation of Canada.

The spirit of appreciation of national progress is growing in Canada almost as fast as the country itself is forging ahead. The Ottawa Journal reaches this conclusion: "The expansion of Toronto is greater than that of Buffalo, Cleveland or Detroit."
