

# Uses One Noise To Blanket Others To Quiet Machinery

OTTAWA (CP)—A Russian-born Canadian scientist has found a way to eliminate much of the noise in the huge, roaring machines of the paper mills.

The National Research Council scientist, Dr. George Thiessen, has devised a complex mathematical formula for re-arranging thousands of suction holes on one of the machine cylinders called a "couch roll."

This roll is extremely noisy but when the holes are re-arranged and the cylinder moves at the right speed range, "the sound waves interfere with each other and nearly all of the noises are cancelled out," the council said in a statement Thursday.

Dr. Thiessen, 42, who emigrated to Canada from Russia in 1923, is head of NRC's acoustics group in the applied physics division.

A year ago he came into the news when he went to the rescue of the paper mills, which had complained that machine noise was one of the industry's worst technical difficulties.

As an emergency step, he invented anti-noise ear muffs. Liquid partly fills a sheath, shaped like a doughnut, to fit over the ear.

But the real problem, said the council, was to get at the source of the noise—the machines themselves.

Dr. Thiessen found that much of the noise comes from the couch roll—a cylinder about four feet in diameter and 10 to 20 feet long. It is pierced by more than 100,000 quarter-inch holes to which suction can be applied.

**DREDGING AT SAVAGE HARBOR**

What is expected to be a great boon to the fishermen of Savage Harbour and vicinity will be realized in the course of a couple of months when the Federal Department of Public Works dredge No. 12 (above) worms its way through a wall of sand making an entirely new entrance for fishing boats.

Savage Harbour which serves over 32 boats is plagued like most of the harbours on the north shore of the island with shifting sandbars which make it difficult for boats to navigate at low tide and dangerous in rough weather.

At present fishing craft have to make quite a roundabout to follow the channel out to the Gulf of St. Lawrence and quite often they are not sure from day to day whether the channel will be in the same place as it was on the day previous, so inconsistent are the moving sands.

Two years ago the Department of Public Works constructed a 1,200 foot channel protection pier in anticipation of the work now being carried out.

The dredge being used has a large agitator at the front which loosens the sand which in turn is pumped out and deposited on the low lying beaches. It has a capacity for moving from three to four hundred cubic yards per hour. When the channel is completed it is anticipated that the protection pier will prevent the sands from moving in and thus give fishermen a safe harbour at all times.

The volume of traffic to and from the harbour will in all events be increased as a result.

The dredge started work last fall and after suspending operations for the winter resumed work last Spring. Captain D. A. MacNally is in charge of the dredge. The work is being carried on under the supervision of Mr. Clive Currie, Division Engineer. Mr. E. J. Anderson, superintendent of dredging for the Maritime Provinces and supervising engineer, Hubert Roach.

**Rocks Geneva And Also American Politics**

President Eisenhower has dropped a blockbuster into the Geneva conference and perhaps into American politics as well.

He proposes that Russia and the United States give each other blueprints of their military installations and provide for cross-inspection by aerial photography.

Russia can hardly accept, unless she is willing to change her whole foreign policy which is based on her power of attack, but will be in an extremely embarrassing position if she refuses.

The president might find himself in an extremely embarrassing position if Russia did accept. The school of intransigence against Russia in the United States, fearful of being trapped if Russia is trusted in any fashion, is perhaps not large enough to kill ratification of such an agreement in Congress, but is sufficient to put up a bitter fight.

How, they can ask, will aerial inspection in Russia actually ensure that her own inspection rights will not be used to prepare the very attack which is feared, or that the Russian blueprints will be honest? And those will not be the only questions.

EASE FEAR OF WAR

But the entire proposal has a wonderful appeal to that part of world opinion which fears Russia or the United States will eventually start a war which would be bound to become general.

# WWVA Jamboree To Play On Island

The World's Original WWVA Jamboree, which celebrated its 22nd year of broadcasting January 7, 1955, continues to grow in popularity and comes to Summerside, July 27 and Charlottetown, July 28.

In writing a brief sketch of the Jamboree's history, many colorful details must be omitted, but we trust we will miss none of the milestones. And the first occurred after the first broadcast: the show became a theatre presentation, due to the tremendous response of listeners.

Its first "home" was the Capitol Theatre where it was known as the Midnight Jamboree. In 1934 the first Harvest Festival Jamboree was presented before an audience of 3,511. The WWVA Jamboree was fast gaining the reputation of "The Show All America Listens to on Saturday Night."

1936 also marked the first outdoor Jamboree, held at Wheeling Island Stadium. It drew a record crowd of 5,000. April 1941 the Jamboree went on tour, the last for the duration of the war.
