



Reese Honored By Fans; Responds With 2 Doubles As Brooks Down Braves 8-4

BROOKLYN, (AP)—They threw a night for Pee Reese Friday night in Ebbets Field—and a big one it turned out to be. A crowd of 33,003, largest of the season, watched the Brooks slug Milwaukee Braves 8-4 and howled themselves hoarse as Reese hit two doubles and was involved in three of his team's runs.

The Brooklyn shortstop for 15 years was showered with gifts, including an automobile. Reese will be 36 today.

The first time up, Reese doubled, sending Don Hoak across the plate with the first run of the game. In the sixth he doubled and scored on a single by Duke Snider and a sacrifice fly by Gil Hodges.

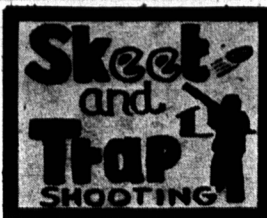
