Among the brighter features of last night's game was the return in the third period of defenseman Johnny Dutchak. Johnny, who has been sidelined for more than two weeks with torn ligaments in his knee was a surprise starter and was forced into action only through the Islanders' player shortage. It was the first time that he had been on skates since he had been injured but he didn't look like a player who had been laid up for two weeks. In the dressing room afterwards he complained that his knee did not bother him too much. His knee is still slightly swollen.

During the ten or so minutes that he played Johnny turned in a good performance. He hit incoming forwards with authority, made a beautiful diving block on a shot by Billy Warwick and played well on the attack. His presence on defence made incoming forwards show a respect which was quite noticeable. Halifax coach Wilf Fields noted that the player's return to the team was a big help. He said, "It is the one man the Islanders really need out there."

That big left winger who scores goals almost as regularly as the clock ticks, Walter Pawlyshyn turned in one of his best games of the season. Walter fired two goals to increase his total for the season to 30 and this for a fellow who missed the first few weeks and who was bothered with a bad back for quite a while, is good going. His second goal was a great piece of work as he carried the puck out of his own end, split the defence, and when goalie Jimmy Strachan came out to get the puck, Walter went around him and nonchalantly backhanded the disc into the open cage. Walter has been hitting his stride of late and is now only ten goals behind Jim Anderson of Glouce Bay, the league's leading goal scorer. There are only about 21 games left for the Islanders but we don't hesitate to predict that Walter will be pretty close if not up to Anderson before March 19.

Wilf Fields has his sights set on second place and believes that the Saints will finish the schedule in that coveted location. Will qualified his statement by the use of the word "think" but he reminded us of a prediction he made on December 15 when the Saints were in the cellar. This prediction was that the Saints would finish in the place pool. The advantage of having the first two play-off games at home is the only material reward for coming second.

The Halifax dressing room was "very, very warm," stated Fields and he added that that was the factor responsible for the Saints' fast start. Fields feels that if the Saints can survive the first period they are all right for the game. "The boys have a sort of a third period mental outlook that they can win games in the last stanza," he said. He added that he knew after the first period last night that his team would win.

Halifax defenseman Bob Drainville had his thumb broken in Glouce Bay Saturday night and will be out of action for a week. Fields plans to rest him and then have a playing cast made for the thumb. "Dutch" Montague is the player who was supposed to join Halifax, came as far east as Saint Catherine's, Ontario, and then went back to Tacoma, Washington. Fields states that he can get a replacement for him as his name was entered before Feb. 1.

Last summer when Bill Brown was attempting to bring the fight game back into popularity here he had trouble in securing enough suitable opponents to fill a card. Last night for the third game in a row Johnny Morrow and Phil Vitale had their usual scrap with the result that both players got the gate. The fight, like the others, proved nothing to anybody nor to either of the players. Neither player has shown any superiority over the other and they hurt nobody except their teammates who had to work that much harder to fill another man's place. There is no need for any feud between them for when they were teammates they were good friends. It's about time that each swallowed his pride and settled down to play hockey for those match misconducts are tough on a team and besides too much repetition instead of adding zest to the picture gets rather boring.

The Islanders last night started with twelve men and after Vitale was given the gate they had only eleven. One of them "Bucko" Trainor was a sick man with the flu and there was talk before the game that he might not be able to

# Saints Move Closer To Second Place With 6-4 Win Over Islanders

Wilf Fields' Halifax Saints moved to within one point of second place last night by scoring two unanswered goals in the last period and defeating the injury-riddled Islanders 6-4 in a wide open, well played game at the Forum.

Winger Kenny MacKenzie's second goal of the game with an island defenseman in the penalty box proved to be the winner. Dewey Thompson shot the clincher into an open net with 25 seconds left in the contest.

Prior to Thompson's goal it was still anybody's game as both teams fought at a fast clip for those important two points. With a minute and 35 seconds left in the game coach Lamoureux pulled goalie Ray Frederick and used six men up the ice but the Islanders could not beat Strachan.

The Islanders led the puck with 50 seconds left and Frederick returned to his cage. 15 seconds later Frederick was pulled for the second time but the Islanders did not get a shot at the Halifax cage. Finally the puck came out over the blue line with Thompson after it and he shot it from centre ice into the net.

The Islanders led in both the first and second periods but both times the Saints came back to go ahead before the sessions ended. At the end of the first period it was 2-1 for Halifax and at the end of the second stanza 4-3 for the Saints.

Early in the third period the Islanders got back in the game on a beautiful goal by big Walt Pawlyshyn who raced through the whole Halifax team and backhanded the puck past Strachan who came out of his cage.

### Dutchak Returns

But it proved to be their last counter of the night. At 10:53 Johnny Dutchak, who returned to the ice in the third period after a lay-off for two weeks with a knee injury, drew a two minute slashing penalty.

The Saints put on a power play after a sustained attack MacKenzie scored. Bergeron started the play with a pass from the blue line to the uncovered MacKenzie in front of the net.

The three veterans, MacKenzie, Pete Leswick and Dewey Thompson each scored a brace to account for all the Halifax goals. Leswick's second goal was a beautiful piece of work as he ducked a defenseman at the blue line, raced into the clear and out-guessed Ray Frederick.

Walter Pawlyshyn led the Charlottetown attack with two goals and one assist. Bruno Favero scored once and assisted on another while Don Bellringer scored the first goal of the night.

The Johnny Morrow-Phil Vitale show was re-enacted once again for the benefit of those who missed the previous games. Both players retired with match misconducts after a five minute performance early in the second period.

The fight started when Vitale carried Morrow into the backboards in the Islanders end. Without further preliminaries the players grabbed one another and started to throw punches. After being separated by the referees the players continued to argue and after seeing away the fighters picked their wrong gloves.

Both players threw their gloves at one another and the fight started again. Matters were about even with few punches being landed and this time the officials gave the players the gate.

### Islanders Short-handed

This left the Islanders with only eleven players for the remainder of the period. "Bucko" Trainor moved back on defence and coach Lamoureux used only two lines up front.

Goalies Ray Frederick and Jimmy Strachan each turned in good performances. Frederick was brilliant on close in shots as the visiting forwards roared in on break-aways. In the first period he made

Danny Nixon was sitting in the penalty box when the Islanders scored twice within 20 seconds on a furious power attack in the second period. Favero scored the first from directly in front of the net with assists going to Whitlock and Pawlyshyn.

Pawlyshyn put the Islanders ahead with a screened shot from the blue line 16 seconds later. Walter took a pass from Bob Gray.

The lead lasted only three minutes as Dewey Thompson tied it up. Thompson raced in on Frederick unmoled and scored on a partially blocked shot. Seven minutes later Leswick scored his picture goal to put the Saints ahead 4-3.

### Last Period Best

The most brilliant hockey of the night was played in the last period as both teams gave out with their best. Hughie Campbell was chased with a match misconduct after he violently dispuled a highsticking penalty with referee Charlie Goode. While Campbell was serving his major the Islanders pressed but could not score.

The Islanders played without the services of George McLagan, Conny Bonhomme and Jim MacKenzie. The Saints were without defencemen Bob Drainville, and Fred Weaver.

Walter Pawlyshyn was the pick of the Islanders forwards with one of his best games of the season. "Buck" Whitlock and Willie Marshall also turned in strong games while Johnny Dutchak came back in the third period to play heads up hockey.

Kenny MacKenzie and Pete Leswick were standouts for the Saints along with Dewey Thompson, Hughie Campbell and Billy Watson.

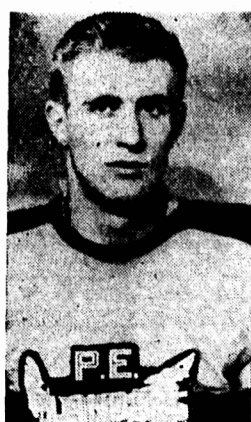

## Work Progressing On Extension To Telephone Bldg.

Despite adverse building weather work is progressing satisfactorily on the extension to the P.E.I. Telephone Company building on Queen and Fitzroy streets. The new section was boarded in to permit continuous work.

The extension carries the main structure back another 25 feet and in addition an extra floor is being added over all. The basement has been completed and the brickwork has now reached to the second story. Concrete floors have been poured on all three storeys and workmen are now starting to put on the roof.

The new structure has all steel joists in the section and on the roof with steel columns supporting it in the centre. When completed the entire building will be practically double the area of the present facilities. Considerable changes will also be made in the old part, including the offices.

The entire contract, being handled by M. F. Schurman Company is for approximately \$250,000, a large undertaking here at this season. Employed on the work at present are a staff of upwards of 30 including 7 masons, 8 carpenters and 10 laborers.

It is being built to permit the installation of the dial telephone equipment and should be ready some time this fall, according to Mr. D. M. Gass, manager of the local company. The recently granted increase in telephone service rates were conditional upon an improvement in service felt that only through dial service could this be done in the capital city.

Work on the extension building was started last fall and workmen were fortunate in getting the concrete for the foundations poured and set just a matter of days before the first frosts came. Much work was necessary in the basement and more is to be done. Thick concrete walls had to be torn out and new ones put in. And in at least one instance a basement storage room more than a foot to make it on the same level as the new basement floor.

Meantime the ordinary work of all members of the Telephone Company staff goes on as usual. While it is naturally expected that there will eventually be difficulties encountered in changing over from the manual system to dial Mr. Gass is confident that the change can be made with no interruption in the service.

# Sydney Millionaires Perk Up To Swamp Moncton Hawks 10-2 At Sydney

SYDNEY, N.S., Feb. 11 — (CP) — Lowly Sydney Millionaires had a re-awakening tonight and swamped fifth-place Moncton Hawks 10-2 before 1,300 fans in a Maritime Major Hockey League game. The win left them three points behind Hawks.

Playing coach Cliff Roach, Sydney's top scorer, benched himself and got top work from some of the more unsung types, chiefly Frank Bathgate, who picked up two goals and two assists, and Ron Rohmer, who fired two and helped on another. Defenceman Bill Dinning set up three goals.

Cliff took Hawks 25 minutes to come out of their dressing room for the third period, referees being informed the players wanted a re-sharpening of skates.

Coach Johnny Horeck claimed "sabotage." He said the skates, delivered to a local sharpener, came back dull. But Sydney slammed home three more tallies after Hawks were satisfied their skates were sharp.

The game was further delayed in the third when goalkeeper Cliff Hicks squeezed the puck against the post after a shot from the boards. Hawks claimed it was a goal, and some of them left the ice, but the goal judge ruled no score and play was resumed.

The full Moncton staff and four Sydney players were inside the Moncton crease when Bruce Gallagher tapped the puck through for the first score. Dunc MacIntyre zipped another home shortly afterwards.

Hawks got their first one when rearguard Orville (Red) Olsen, easily the hardest-working and most consistent player in Moncton uniform, charged through to sift passes from Ray Marshall and Danny Horeck.
