THE Intercolonial is having its fair share of accidents this summer. Yesterday the Northern express train had a smash up, and this detained the boats last evening. The boat train did not reach Picton till 3 o'clock. We hear of no one having been injured by the accident.

THE Intercolonial Railway Engineers have had their troubles remedied. The Railway Ministers have already, since his return, reversed the action of the subordinate authorities on the road in dismissing engineers connected with their brotherhood. The dismissed officials are to lose nothing by the mistaken course adopted toward them.

THE late coal find along the route of the Intercolonial Railway, a few miles from Truro, if it prove as valuable as expected, will have important consequences. The deposits lie very near the iron deposits from which the celebrated Londonderry steel is manufactured. The coal is spoken of as being superior even to the best Sydney coal.

THE arrest to-day of Mr. Henry Blatch, Chief Clerk of the County Court of Queen's County, on a charge of having committed the recent robbery on the premises of Carvell Brothers, is now the chief topic of conversation on our streets. We have not learned the grounds upon which the arrest was made. The amount stolen from Carvell Bros. was about \$800.

ON the 30th ult., the house of Mr. A. Reynolds, at Machon Point, caught fire from children playing with matches. In a short time it was consumed, with nearly all its contents, and, if it had not been for the willing help of C. LeLacheur, Esq., and the crew of the steam dredge, other buildings near would also have been destroyed. Much sympathy is shown by the whole neighborhood. A subscription list was at once started, and a considerable sum already promised.

HITHERTO the competition in the flower department at the Provincial Exhibition has not been very brisk. It is hoped that all lovers of flowers will not fail to send in plants for competition. In addition to the chance of securing a prize, the senders will confer a great pleasure on the visitors. Nothing adds so much to the beauty of a collection as a fine display of flowers. Crowds gather round the plants; a taste is implanted for better varieties, and the blankness of the Drill Shed is brightened by the beauty of the floral display. Let the competition in this line be brisk.

THE committee for arranging matters with reference to the Bench Show met last evening at A. McNeill's Rooms, Mr. E. W. Dawson in the chair. The following resolutions were formed:—That entries for exhibiting exhibitors of dogs will be received up to Monday evening the 9th inst., at 8 p. m. The money must accompany each entry—25 cents for each and every dog—for which the owner will receive a ticket of classification admitting same to the show grounds. Dogs must be properly collared and chained, and on the grounds at 10 o'clock, a. m., Wednesday, 11th October. Committee to look after the building of kennels, E. W. Dawson Dr. Robins, A. J. Karney. By requisition of Committee, the latter gentleman kindly consented to act as judges.

TWO men named Joseph G. Arseneault and Andrew Gallant, were charged, yesterday, before J. W. Howe, Esq., J. P., for Prince Edward Island, with having, on Thursday, the 5th day of October, broken seven panes of glass and a window sash of the Miscouche Railway Station, and of conducting themselves in a disorderly and riotous manner. The evidence was very strong against Arseneault, but, while Gallant did not openly assist Arseneault in committing the damage, there was sufficient evidence to show that he encouraged him. The Magistrate fined Arseneault \$15.00 or thirty days imprisonment, besides ordering him to pay for the damage, and Gallant \$5.00 or twenty days. Gallant paid his fine, and was discharged, but Arseneault, having nothing smaller than a hundred dollar note of the Confederate States was committed to prison. Mr. E. J. Hollings, Q. C., appeared for the prosecution.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Sultan's Anger

Escape of Prisoners

Typhoid Fever at Ramleh.

ALEXANDRIA, Oct. 6.

The Sultan is very angry over the unceremonious way in which Baker Pacha tendered his resignation. He looks upon the Khedive's action, in accepting the services of the runaway, as a personal affront. He has demanded the immediate dismissal of Baker, and has ordered the Khedive to send him back to Turkey.

During the recent disturbances at Hedjah, Midhat Pacha and many other state prisoners escaped. It is believed that the disturbances were started for the purpose of allowing the prisoners to escape. Many of the late leaders are idolized by the people, and great caution is required to keep them quiet.

There is no less than eighty cases of typhoid fever in the hospitals at Ramleh. The number of persons afflicted with the fever is rapidly increasing, and is taxing the medical staff to the utmost. The water in the Suez Canal is putrid and is thought to be the cause of the fever.

AGRARIAN OUTRAGES.

Troops Revolting—The Anti Jewish Riots—Chili and Peru.

LONDON, Oct. 6.

News has been received here that agrarian outrages have broken out in the Balkan Provinces. Many Gevman landholders here have been attacked by the laborers. The number of outrages is increasing. Most of the laborers belong to the Russian peasantry, and were engaged for the cheapness of their labor.

The troops of the Emir at Bokhara have revolted. The authorities are, as yet, powerless to bring the military leaders to terms.

No cessation in the Anti-Jewish riots has yet taken place. Notwithstanding the energetic working of the Royal Commission, the number of outrages continue to increase, and the authorities are powerless to check them.

News reaches here that Chili and Peru have broken off peace negotiations.

[Montero arrived at Arequipa on September 12. He was received enthusiastically. He has formed a new Cabinet, has 50,000 troops, and intends to induce Bolivia to send an army of 10,000 to Peru to help to continue the war.]

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, Oct. 5.

A despatch from Constantinople reports the Sultan as extremely vexed at the departure of Baker Pacha. It is stated that the governors of Smyrna and Rhodes were ordered to arrest him and the Khedive has been ordered to send him back.

There is consternation among the Parnellites owing to a report that on the recommendation of Archbishop McCabe, the Irish hierarchy, now in session, has refused to allow priests to attend the forthcoming conference.

The Standard's Dublin correspondent says he has good reason to believe that the proposed national convention will be postponed.

The pugilist Elliott has put up \$1,000 forfeit, and challenges any man in the world to fight him for \$2,500.

CAIRO, Oct. 5.

Gen. Wolseley yesterday issued a general order complimenting the British troops engaged in the Egyptian campaign on their endurance, courage, gallantry and good behavior. The order says the Queen is proud of her soldiers, and General Wolseley, in the Queen's name, thanks them for their valor and discipline.

The usual yearly caravan with the sacred carpet for Mecca started to-day. There was a vast concourse of spectators, and a British guard of honor was present. All passed off quietly.

BERLIN, Oct. 5.

The snapping of a chain caused the fall of the iron curtain among the footlights on the stage of the Royal Opera House here, this evening. The accident caused an intense panic among the audience, and many persons were severely crushed but no one killed. The house was soon cleared.
