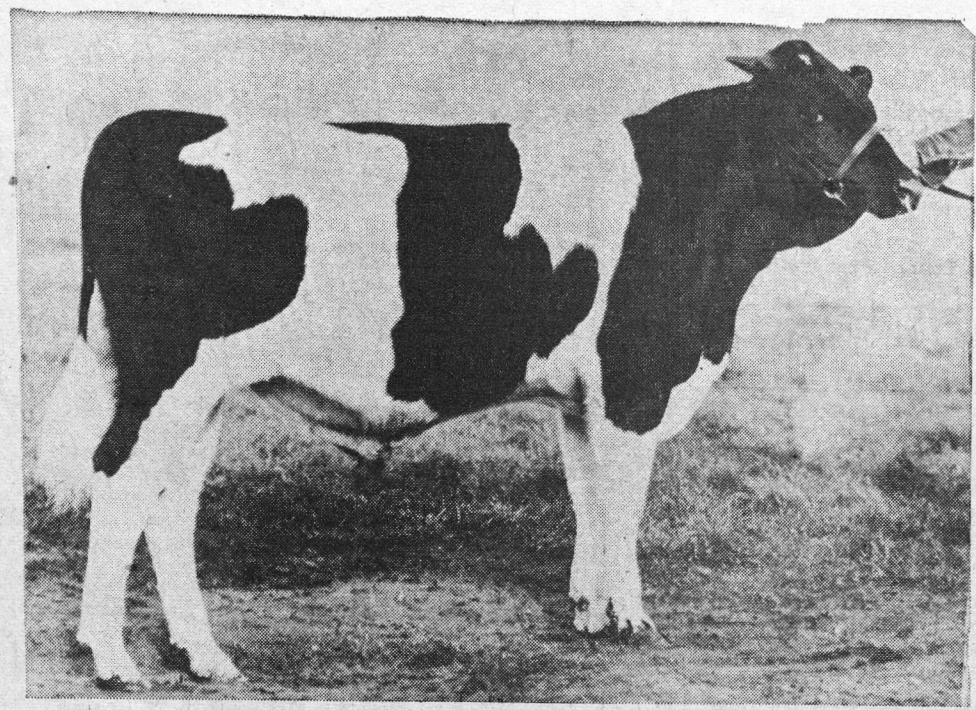


Replies To Questions Tabled In The Legislature

The following answers to questions dealing with administration of the liquor store in Charlottetown, the amount of money missing in the Government Printing Department, the Dominion Provincial Conference of November, 1957, and the Government's policy with regard to margarine, were tabled in the Legislature this week:

- (1) Were any persons, hotels or restaurants in this Province given the privilege of having and selling intoxicating liquors during the year 1957? If so, how many?
(2) If answer to (1) is yes, were the liquors supplied by the P.E.I. Liquor Commission?
(3) If answer to (2) is yes, were liquors supplied at cost, wholesale or retail prices?
(4) Has a shortage of a large sum of money, upwards of \$20,000.00, been reported to the Government in reference to the P.E.I. Liquor Commission or the Charlottetown Liquor Store?
(5) Is an investigation being made at the present time re shortages at the Charlottetown Liquor Store?
(6) What was the total amount missing in the Government Printing Department?
(7) Has any of this amount been recovered? If so, how much and from whom?
ANSWERS
(1) There is no organization known as the P.E.I. Liquor Commission. It is presumed the question refers to the Prince Edward Island Temperance Commission. See Prince Edward Island R.S. P.E.I. 1951, Chapter 159. By reference to this Statute, Section 7, it will be seen that the issuance of all permits and licenses is controlled by the Commission. I am informed by the Commission that the answer to part (1) is "No."

OUTSTANDING BULL PURCHASED

Carnation Specialist, a young bull with a tremendous milk pedigree behind him, has been purchased by the MacArthur Brothers, Union Road (Queens County) for their Bessborough Holstein herd. The young sire was brought from the Carnation Milk Farm herd at Seattle, Washington. He is one of the very few Carnation-

bred animals in Eastern Canada. The bull's six nearest dams average 24,496 lbs. milk and 993 lbs. fat with an average test of 4.08 pc. He comes from a long line of heavy producing animals of splendid type. His paternal great-grand sire had 38 tested daughters over 1,000 lbs of butter fat and 14 of them had records between 1088

and 1512 pounds of butter fat. A maternal sister, Carnation Lola, has a 6-year-old record of 29,954 lbs. of milk, 1105 lbs. fat on three-times-a-day milking. All American ratings are sprinkled liberally among the animals in Specialist's pedigree. His breeding goes back to cows on both sides to Governor of Carnation, one of the all time greats at the big milk farm.
