REGRETTABLE.

The mandate of Archbishop Cleary published to-day, seems to be inconsistent with the Divine injunction to "rejoice with those who do rejoice and weep with those who weep." Surely there is no more innocent pleasure than attendance at the nuptials of a friend, whether he or she be a Catholic or Protestant or anything else; and if Protestants and Catholics may live and work, and suffer and buy and sell and do business together without compromising the doctrines or principles of the church, surely they may be also allowed to mingle their tears in the last tribute of sorrow and respect for the dead. It seems to us that the attendance of a Catholic at a Protestant wedding or funeral cannot possibly involve the Church at large. It is, what of attendance at taverns, gaming houses and other scenes of actual sin about which Archbishop Cleary has not delivered a mandate?

"INDEPENDENCE" EXEMPLIFIED.

The Guardian ventured a prediction, a few days ago, as to the personnel of the Warburton Cabinet. The prediction happened to be approximately correct, though it is unfulfilled in respect to Mr. Wise, the Liberal representative farmer; and the Guardian of this morning proceeds to boast that "the earlier intelligence which our readers received goes to show the value of a genuine newspaper as compared with a mere party organ." The judicious public which refuses to take guesses for news, will rather, we think, appreciate the "genuine newspaper" which gives the public the facts at the earliest moment. Within one hour of the formation of the Warburton Cabinet the names of the new ministers were laid before the people by THE EXAMINER and the Patriot, while the Guardian comes in at the heel of the hunt, fifteen or sixteen hours later, with a vain and ridiculous boast about the "earlier intelligence" conveyed in a mere surmise!

A day or two before the Liberal party in caucus chose Mr. Warburton to be their Leader the Guardian prated about the "elements that make for moral order" in the Liberal party and the elements on "the other side." But now that "the other side" has won, "now that the deliberate choice of the Liberal party in respect to its Leader has been made," the Guardian tries to "sugar o'er" its insulting insinuations by the declaration that the "new administration is composed of respectable men of fair abilities" and by suggesting that "the Hon. H. C. McDonald "should get his return unopposed." Such is the independence of the Guardian—such the valor with which it contends against "elements" which it contrasts with those that are "moral," and which it has declared "would continue the too lavish expenditures of the past and the efforts to conciliate the liquor interests, with other features of weakness." Such independence and steadfastness to principle is on a par with that which the Guardian has displayed in its denunciation of the Charlottetown Club, followed by sending its chief editor to attend a champagne supper in the Club rooms! The poet's strong characterization of those who "live a living lie to be a mighty thing among the mean" seems to fit the Guardian.

—Many readers of THE EXAMINER will regret to learn that John Brecken, Esquire, has passed away. Mr. Brecken was at one time an active member of the City Council and an influential citizen of Charlottetown. But he has lately lived in retirement. He is the elder brother of our esteemed postmaster, Hon. Fredk. Brecken. We sympathize with those whom Mr. Brecken has left to mourn.

—The Montreal Gazette says that what may be regarded as a semi-official intimation is made that Grenier, the libeller of Mr. Tarte, will not be soon released. The announcement that Mr. Tarte, was to intercede for him, made in the paper that the hero controls by virtue of Mr. Green-shield's cheque, must have been for public consumption rather than an evidence of good intentions.

THE GROWTH OF EVIL.

WHAT contributes to the growth of evil? The Mail and Empire, in answer to this question says: "There seems to be a combination of causes. Religious indifference, impropriety of thought and language, the race for pleasure rather than for work, bad literature, a press that depicts vice in gaudy colours, all help to break down moral restraints and to make wickedness tolerable, endurable, and finally acceptable, when it ought to be hated and shunned. The basis for these influences is the destructive theory that the human being is merely an animal, living through its little day, having no responsibility to its Maker or its neighbour, and, as some have argued, therefore entitled to sin. I is a case of "eat, drink, and be merry, for tomorrow we die." The fight against viciousness, of course, must be conducted, in some measure, with a view to meeting conditions as we find them; but it must also aim at the root of the disorder. It must commence with early training. The young must be taught the sacredness of home the hideousness of wickedness, the nobility of a good character, the blessings of an honest life, the responsibilities resting upon everyone in respect of this treatment of his neighbour, the accountability in the future for the wrong that is done today. We cannot build upon a foundation that is not fully and firmly set. Neither can we establish a state that shall be endurable upon lax principles and bad morals. Here is where the work of reform commences. The churches do their part. But, as religion ought not to be exclusively a Sunday influence, so the inculcation of sound morals is a task that ought not to be left for the Church alone to do. Every person of sound intelligence is in a position to set the example or to express the opinion which forms the time and guides the conduct of the community."

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Halifax Herald: The Grits over in Prince Edward Island appear to be having a stubborn fight among themselves as to who shall be premier in succession to Mr. Peters. They have undoubtedly lost their ablest man, and would be weak enough without him in any case, but they are aggravating the situation by party dissensions, which will be a source of still greater weakness in future. Such a party fight is not over when the premier is ultimately chosen.

Moncton Times: After all the flourish of trumpets it is now announced that the extension of the Intercolonial to Montreal is not to be opened for business on the 1st of November as was expected. A speed of 42 miles in 2 1/2 hours of an eight car train on a trial trip is not very promising for a 24 hours run between Halifax and Montreal, which has been promised by Tarte and Blair; and considerable improvements it is said will have to be made before the formal opening for fast traffic.

Montreal Gazette: Mr. Hardy, the Liberal Premier of Ontario, has been admitting that the Sandfield Macdonald surplus no longer exists. The Blakes, Mowats and Hardys spent it, and have incurred heavy debt obligations besides. Still, it is a foolish thing for Mr. Hardy to let the truth out. Sir Oliver Mowat would never have done it. The supposition surplus was his standby, and no one looking at his benevolent countenance as he dilated upon it could for a moment think that it could not be produced to be counted whenever it was needed. Mr. Hardy, it is evident, is not up to snuff. It is time for a change.

NEWS NOTES

Reports received at Ottawa indicate that the later arrivals of Canadian fruit in England were much more successful than earlier ones. Pears, peaches and tomatoes sold well.

In Moncton, on Saturday night a rather amusing mode of arrest was witnessed. The night officers found Mary Frances paralyzed with liquor and lying in the vacant lot north of the old Donnelly house. She was unable to walk and they gently placed her in a basket and had her driven to the lockup.

The new issue of postage stamps will be on sale about December 1st. They bear the vignette of the Queen as she appears today. The colors of the ones, threes and fives will be changed in accordance with the postal union regulations to green, red and blue, respectively. The other denominations are unchanged.

Spanish naval forces in Caribbean Sea will be strengthened. A member of the cabinet says the government intends to give Cuba complete self government with universal suffrage. The Island parliament will be composed of two chambers, having complete control of taxation and tariff with a cabinet of five members.

The Yerkes telescope which two McGill professors helped to inaugurate last week possesses the truly American distinction of being "the greatest on earth." But it has higher recommendations than this. So far as mere size is concerned, its claims might be disputed by the famous Rosse telescope erected in Ireland over half a century ago. But while the Rosse telescope is a reflector, the Yerkes instrument is a refractor, and is on that account much more useful for the purposes of astronomical research. In rigidity, accuracy, and ease of use, and perfection of equipment, the Yerkes telescope is apparently superior to anything yet known. Good men have been secured for the observatory and work is being undertaken in a truly scientific spirit.

HOME MAKERS.

MR. SCANLAN BURIED.

The Irish Societies of which He Was a Member Participated.

The funeral of Michael J. Scanlan, of Roxbury, who was found dead in the woods in Prince Edward Island by the members of the search party which left Boston for the purpose, took place yesterday morning with a solemn high mass of requiem in All Saints Church.

The funeral cortege left the late home of Mr. Scanlan at 29 Fort avenue at 9.30 a. m., and was escorted to the church by many hundreds of his brethren in the different societies of which he was a member.

At the close of the services the funeral procession reform'd, and although the rain came down in a steady drizzle, the participants marched through Centre street, and thence to the junction of Dudley and Washington.

The right of the line was occupied by the members of Division 19 A. O. H. Roxbury, of which Mr. Scanlan was ex-treasurer, led by President Joseph F. Madden and delegations from Divisions 3, 30, 38, 39 41, 43, 48 and 50. With them were representatives of the Thomas Francis Meagher Football Association, Roxbury, the Sheridan Club, Roxbury, which Mr. Scanlan was president; the Roxbury Liquor Dealers' Protective Association, the Winchester Associates, the Catholic Knights of America and the Knights of the Red Branch.

The pallbearers who acted as body guard were Captain John J. Hickey, who also had charge of the funeral arrangements; P. P. Neale, Captain John P. Cronin, J. H. B. O'Higgins, Michel C. Roche, David Woolf, Charles Devine and Patrick V. O'Mahony.

The honorary pallbearers were: Messrs. Patrick Ducey, Thomas J. Burke, John J. Reynolds and Owen Tevnan.

The chief mourners were Mrs. Scanlan and two children, Richard and Mrs. Furniss and Mr. Michael Scanlan and Miss Scanlan.

The cortege was over a mile and a half in length, and was in charge of Messrs. Hickey and Madden, assisted by the officers of the different societies.

The interment was in Calvary Cemetery, which was reached about 1 p. m.

There were numerous beautiful floral tributes, consisting of a broken column from Mrs. Scanlan, a cross and pillow from the children of deceased, splendid cross and base from Mr. and Mrs. Furniss, and other tokens from the Thomas Francis Meagher Association, Division 15, A. O. H.; Division 50, A. O. H.; the Sheridan Club, and the friends of Mr. Scanlan in Division 38.—Boston Post, Oct 22.
