A Talk With Paul Jay And A Look At Junior Abbies

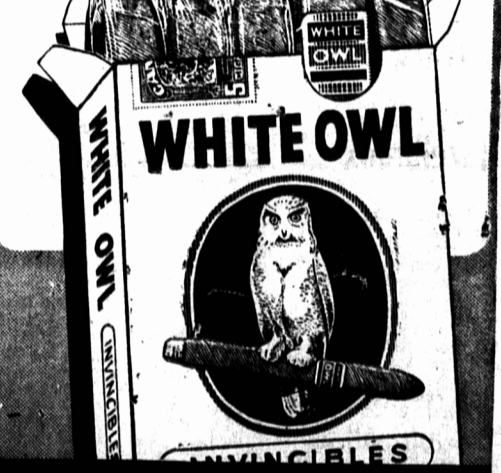
