But he omitted to touch the third base on his way in and base judge Jimmie Hogan so ruled it when appealed to by third sacker Bobbie Timmins. To make matters worse Goodwin was caught at second trying to stretch his single into a double. A very real threat faded as Sheppard struck out to end the inning and the game.

The C. & B. boys picked up a run in the second inning on a walk and two wild heaves. In the third Jimmie Grady singled to centre, took second on an infield out and scored on Hank Landry's safe single to left. The visitors got their single tally in the eighth. Trainor singled to right and Cairns hit a safety to centre. With two out, MacKinnon drove Trainor across with a safe hit through the centre. Pineau hit what looked like another safe single to right field on which two runs would have scored but Gord MacKay, playing a shallow right field, nipped Pineau at first to end the inning.

Gene Bearden Parts Company With Indians

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 2—(AP)—Hands Gene Bearden, whose knuckleball pitches sparked Cleveland Indians to their first pennant in 28 years, parted company with the club today — with a little bitterness.

At first, the six-foot-three southpaw grumbled to a reporter he might not report right away to Washington Nationals, who acquired him for the \$10,000 waiver price.

But he showed up on time at the Washington clubhouse tonight before a game with the Indians.

"I was just a throw-in on the trade which brought me to Cleveland," Bearden said, "so anything they got for me is velvet." Therefore, he said, he thinks the Tribe should make a "fair financial adjustment" with him.

He was to discuss his demand for more money with general manager Hank Greenberg of the Tribe tonight.

Washington's claim to Bearden got priority over bids by the league-leading Detroit Tigers and second-place New York Yankees. He was to wear a Washington uniform tonight and leave with the Nationals for Detroit after their game here.

Cleveland got Bearden in a trade with the Yankees in 1947, along with Al Gettel and Hal Peck in exchange for Ray Mack and Sherman Lollar. He won 20 games and lost seven in the 1948 drive for the flag. He pitched the Indians into a tie for the flag, then after one day's rest, he won a playoff game with the Boston Red Sox 8-3. During the World Series he beat the Boston Braves 2-0 for his ninth straight victory.

Bearden has had control trouble this season and won only one game against three losses.

IN THE CORNER

With the present prospects of Murph Chamberlain being the playing-coach of Charlottetown's entry in the Maritime Senior Hockey League for the 1950-51 season, the tendency of brightening the hopes of those who are behind the move to bring the Island back into the Maritime hockey picture, after a layoff of some fifteen years. It is an assurance of getting off on the right foot for a successful venture.

Admittedly, to have a good coach one must also have a good team for him to work with if the maximum effort and success is to be attained. In this respect things look promising at the moment. Chamberlain has assured local officials that he will be in a position to obtain a number of good players, most of them of junior calibre, and not ones who have been through the mill and are on the way down the ladder from peak performance. Murph will do the selecting himself and that is a big factor for two main reasons.

First, with him doing the picking, he knows what he needs to build up a strong playing force, and with much of the success of the team resting largely on his shoulders, will naturally want to have the best that is within his means to secure. Secondly, Chamberlain knows his hockey, as he has already proven both as a player and a coach, and should be an excellent contact man to do the work of building up an aggressive team.

Murph is no stranger to these parts, and is known by everybody who follows hockey for his colorful performance in past years with the Montreal Canadiens of the National Hockey League and more recently his successful season last year as coach of Sydney Millionaires. He pitched them to both the Cape Breton and Maritime senior hockey titles. Murph also made a big hit here with Island hockey enthusiasts last year, when while coaching Sydney, came here for three days as one of the leading instructors in the local coaches and referees school held here annually under the sponsorship of the department of Physical Fitness. Anyone attending that school knows only too well of his ability as an up to date mentor of good hockey, both from the point of rules, coaching and judging of player ability.

However, more will be known of the program when he is helping the Island to get back into M. S. H. L. competition again on a sound basis, when he arrives here Friday to discuss the situation with local Club officials and decide whether or not he will take the position of playing coach with the Charlottetown Hockey Club. Many will be looking forward to renewing his acquaintance.

"There was a rumour on second base and one out" states Billy Evans in his "Knotty Problems of Baseball." "The batsman took a healthy swing but his effort simply resulted in a sharp bouncer, the ball going directly to the pitcher. Seemingly an easy cut, the batter in disgust started in the direction of his team's dugout. The pitcher, noting the batter wasn't running out his hit and seeing the runner on second making a break for third, threw the ball to that base and retired the runner."

By this time the batter, who was halfway to the dugout, was made to realize that no play had been made on him and he was eligible to try for first if he could reach the base before the ball. The runner, now halfway to his bench, made a break for first. The third baseman who had the ball, after retiring the runner at that base, threw high over the first baseman's head in trying to retire the batter. The ball went far into right field but the runner was eventually retired trying to reach third on the overthrow. What about this play?

Everything that happened was legal and proper. The batter could not be called out for running out of line. No play was originally made on him. By going to first base via his bench, the batter had simply made the distance that much longer. It turned out to be a decidedly freak twin killing that retired the side."

Another Record Breaking Performance Witnessed At Covehead Yesterday

With the scene of the Island Harness Racing Circuit's Wednesday "matinee meet" shifting to the Covehead track yesterday, it was another record breaking performance for the "Parlor Track" when a large crowd of fans saw three horses lower their mile records during a smart four race program, and others come up with driving battles to the finish wire that saw wins decided by a whisker. Two of the four events were forced into an extra heat before the race winner could be declared.

Holding to his true form as a favorite, to make a clean sweep of the number one event in straight heats, Harold Stead's Calumet Onward lowered his record to 2:13.45 in the first heat of the day, while Jennie Kalmuck, owned by Lorne Lecher of Springhill, N. S., and driven by Mr. O'Donnell, lowered her record by pacing the fastest mile of the meet in 2:11.25 in winning the first heat of the section race. Jennie also won the third heat for race honors, but had to give way to a driving finish by Josedale Hoosier in the second session, an upset victory that brought the biggest single win pay of the day—\$30.70 for a \$2 ticket. Jennie placed second, but was set back to third for swerving coming down the home stretch.

Joandale, driven by Charley Willis, was the third horse to lower her record when she clipped off the first heat of the number four race in 2:17.45. Willard Kelly's Judy Kalmuck won top honors in the second heat while the highly favored Lusty's Queen, owned and driven by Horace B. Willis came through in the third to force the race into an extra heat. Fighting off challenges by Joandale and Judy Kalmuck, Lusty's Queen again came home a winner in the fourth heat for race honors.

It was left to Billy McVey, however, to trot the fastest mile of the program when he nosed out Tiny Budlong at the finish wire in the third heat of the number three race for a time of 2:11.2-5, forcing the race into a fourth and deciding heat, and equalling Jennie Kalmuck's mark in the fastest pace. The other heat winners in the third event were Prince Budlong in the first and Dale B. in the second, the Prince returning again in the extra heat for the final victory and winning purse money, with owner Harold Cudmore handling the ribbons.
