HARD ON NEW BRUNSWICK COURTS.—In six cases appealed from the New Brunswick Supreme Court to the Supreme Court of Canada, and decided on the 10th, in only one case has the judgment of the New Brunswick Court been affirmed. In five cases the decision is "appeal allowed with costs."

THE Cologne Gazette publishes an interview with Prince Bismarck on the Parliamentary situation. He said he would have resigned the Chancellorship after the late defeats but for the personal desire of the Emperor, and that henceforth he would leave parliamentary fighting to others and devote himself entirely to the foreign affairs of the Empire.

A P. E. ISLAND BRIG ON FIRE.—A despatch from London, of June 10th, reports that the brig "Eliza" is on fire at East London, and will probably be a total loss. She had part of her inward cargo on board. The "Eliza" was formerly owned by James Duncan & Co., of this city, but was purchased by a firm in Hawkesbury. She is 225 tons register, and was built at Fortune Bay.

Stripes on a Clergyman's Back.

RECEIVING ELEVEN LASHES A FEW MINUTES BEFORE RECEIVING A STAY OF EXECUTION

Several months ago an indictment was found by the Grand Jury of the County Court of Floyd, Va., against the Rev. Jas. M. Mason, for obtaining goods under false pretences. He was twice summoned to answer the indictment, but never put in an appearance. At the term of the court closed May 29th, a verdict of guilty was found, and the clergyman sentenced to receive eleven lashes, and to be confined in jail until he paid \$26.88, the cost of the prosecution. Mason being a citizen of Montgomery County, a capias was issued, and he was brought to Floyd and committed to jail on the same day. The prisoner employed counsel to obtain a stay of sentence in his case. The application was prepared and sent by a messenger to the Judge who lived some distance from the Court House. The Sheriff was requested not to carry out the sentence until the application could be heard from. This, however, for some reason, was not done, and stripes were laid on Mason's back in accordance with his sentence. A few minutes thereafter an order was received from Judge Vaughan directing a stay of execution until June 26, in order to allow Mason to apply to a higher court for a writ of error. Mason claims that he can establish his innocence, and as soon as he can do so he will institute proceedings against the authorities for damages.
