Newsprint Export Price To Increase

TORONTO, May 20 — (CP)—Canadian newspaper today headed toward a \$10-a-ton increase in price to all but Canadian users. Three big producers, Abitibi Power and Paper Co., Ltd., Consolidated Paper Corporation, Ltd., and Anglo-Canadian Pulp and Paper Mills, Ltd., advised their export customers, chiefly in the United States, that the \$10 jump will go into effect June 15. It followed by other companies, this will bring the price at New York to \$126 a ton. The Canadian base price will remain at \$112, plus a 10-per-cent sales tax, which leaves the cost to Canadian users at around \$122.
