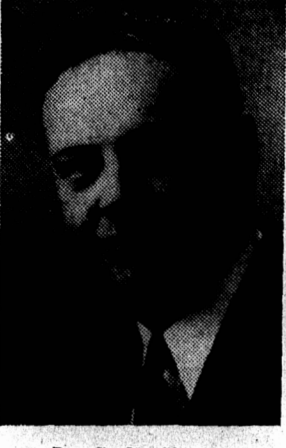

Only routine business was transacted at the Town Council meeting at Montague Thursday night. The meeting was held at the Town Hall with His Worship Mayor W. H. Lane, presiding.

On motion it was carried that the current bills be paid.

It was decided to send a circular letter to each of the merchants in the Town to have them close their stores at 11 P. M. on Saturday night with a view to eliminating much of the disturbance in the early hours of Sunday morning. Several remarked that owing to the large influx on Saturday night, the traffic and disturbances were unusually heavy, and that this might be a method of partially eliminating some of it.

Buggy Recalls Old Times In Montague

The citizens of Montague yesterday were treated to the unusual sight of a horse drawn buggy, with top and all accessories of 1910 vintage. With rubber tire wheels and spring-slung cab, it was a carriage of perfect comfort with a covering top to keep off wind and rain. The buggy was drawn by a nine-year-old horse so intelligent that without reins or bridle he would go where the driver indicated by word of mouth.

The driver, Mr. Frank R. Stevens of Windsor, N.S., has had many notable experiences on his travels throughout the Maritimes, and scorns the idea of modern day travel, when the ever trusty horse can be used, which is not given to the idiosyncrasies of the modern car.

Watterworth Appeal Adjourned

The appeal of Wilfred Watterworth was adjourned yesterday until December 14 after argument by counsel. The appeal is to the Court of Criminal Appeal, consisting of Chief Justice T. A. Campbell, Mr. Justice M. R. MacGuigan and Mr. Justice G. J. Tweedy and is from conviction by Mr. Justice MacGuigan and a jury and sentence of two years in Dorchester penitentiary for theft at Cape Stry of one 5 h.p. Imperial Marine Engine and a quantity of rope, property of Leon Johnston.

Mr. D. L. Mathieson, K.C. argued the case for the appellant, Attorney-General, the Hon. Walter E. Darby, K.C., and Mr. J. O. C. Campbell, K.C. opposed the appeal for the Crown.
