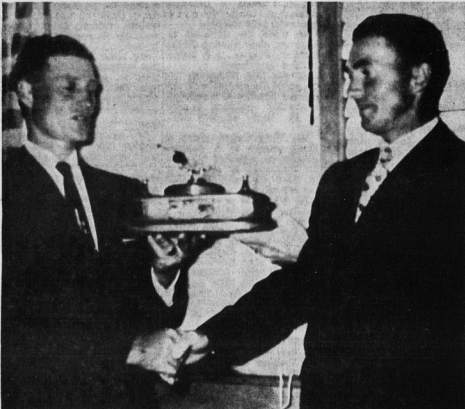

Infractions Of Fishing Regulations Charged

ALBERTON — An Alberton South fisherman, Wilbur Fraser, was found guilty by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald at Alberton yesterday on two counts of fishing without a license and not covered by his license and was fined \$10 and costs on each charge.

Evidence was heard in the case of Wyman Milligan, Alberton, charged with fishing lobsters in a district not covered by his license and unlawfully using a boat in Lobster District 81 which had been used in District 7B during the spring lobster season.

Fishery Officer Raigh Callbeck, Alberton, stated in evidence that on Aug. 10 he saw an Alberton boat offshore from Campbellton on the 5 fishing grounds in District 8. Later the boat came ashore at Campbellton with six men on board and the accused operating the boat.

Three crates of lobsters were landed and taken to Ramsay's factory where a sales slip was made out to Milligan for 338 pounds of lobsters. The accused was issued a lobster fishing license for the spring season in District 7B on the North side, Officer Callbeck said and the boat had fished in District 7B during the spring 1935 season with Milligan as a member of the crew. The boat in question was seized by the dept of fisheries and taken to Charlottetown.

In cross-examination by defense lawyer, Melville Campbell, Officer Callbeck admitted smelling liquor from the occupants of the boat but failed to tell the men they could use the boat that day but not the next. Fishery Officer Roy MacEachern, also stationed in Alberton, corroborated the evidence of the first witness.

The case for the crown is being conducted by Bruce MacDonald. The case was adjourned to Sept. 18.
