Maritime Fertilizer Council Suggests Formula Changes

The annual meeting of the Maritime Fertilizer Council, chaired by E. T. Coring, Nappan, N.S., was held at the Lord Beaverbrook Hotel, Fredericton, last Friday.

Highlights were changes in the fertilizer recommendations in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia; reports on recent experiments on grass and forage crops; the election of officers for 1960 and reports of sales during the past season.

The following formulas were recommended by the respective fertilizer committees for each province:

For N.B., 6-12-12, 3-15-6, 0-20-20 and 10-10-10

For N.S., 6-12-12, 8-16-8, 3-16-16, 3-15-6, 0-20-20 and 9-9-7-B

For P.E.I., 6-12-12, 3-15-6 and 0-20-20

Dr. Cecil Brown of the University of Maine gave one of the most outstanding illustrated talks on the necessity of plenty of fertility and its economic use on various grass and legume crops.

A panel of five, under the chair-

manship of S. A. Hilton, Fredericton, N.B., and composed of E. A. Grant, research station, Fredericton, G. G. Smeiter, research station, Kentville, N.S., K. E. LeLachour, research station, Charlottetown; E. T. Coring, research station, Nappan, N.S., and A. D. Neil farmer of Fredericton, related their experiences with lime and fertilizers on grass.

At the noon luncheon, the guest speaker, A. E. Barrett, assistant to the director general, branch, Ottawa, dealt with the problems of research, such as variability of production in certain countries and even in certain areas due to climate and soil differences and what this information means to farmers in those regions.

Officers elected for 1960 are: President, Lloyd Horton, Maritime Co-operative services, Moncton; Vice-President, G. G. Smeiter, research station, Kentville; Directors: Ian Rankin, Island Fertilizers Inc., Charlottetown; Dr. J. J. Doyle, research station, Fredericton, N.B.; J. E. Milligan, Agricultural College, Truro, N.S.

K. E. LeLachour, research station, Charlottetown; K. Larsen, Canada Packers Ltd., Saint John, N.B.; Lloyd MacLeod, research station, Nappan, N.S.

The secretary, J. E. McIntyre, agricultural agent, C.N.R., Moncton, was reappointed for his 26th year.

Sales of fertilizers compiled by the council secretary indicated a drop in tonnage below 1958; 143,127 tons vs. 148,275. For the respective provinces these were as follows (1958 in brackets): N.B., 61,157 (62,144), N.S., 29,946 (27,674), P.E.I., 48,546 (53,537), Nfld., 5,378 (4,927). It was noted, however, that since more concentrated mixtures were used in 1959, the actual tonnage in terms of plant food would not be materially different.

a witness to the accident. Latest report from the hospital is that the lad is resting comfortably after being treated for an injured leg and a slight shaking up.

Joyrider Found Guilty, Sentence Suspended

SUMMERSIDE — In Summerside Police Court yesterday George Leonard MacDonald of Summerside was found guilty of joyriding and sentence was adjourned until October 29th by Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q.C.

He was also fined \$20 and costs for being intoxicated in a public place of which he was

convicted earlier.

The last witness this morning for the crown Mrs. Shirley Arsenault told the court she saw the accused driving a 1946 maroon Pontiac away from the Willard MacDonald parking lot area and return it a few minutes later. She was on her way home from work at the time which was shortly after five o'clock.

The accused took the stand and told the court he had been working steadily for the past three years and had tried to keep out of trouble.

As a result of a query by Magistrate Hinton, MacDonald said, "I guess I tried her out (the car) more or less around the block."

He reiterated an earlier claim that he wanted to purchase the vehicle.

Sentence was adjourned until the last of October after the accused told the court he had an offer from a Cape Bald fisherman to go to work on August 5th for two months. The Magistrate and crown agreed it was better for him to go to work than to serve a jail sentence.

A resident of Summerside was found guilty of speeding (driving without due care and attention) and was fined \$15 and costs. He pleaded not guilty.

Cast. Harry MacKay stated the car the accused was driving was going "50 to 60 miles per hour or faster." The accused maintained he was only going 20 m.p.h. The offence took place Sunday morning on Duke St.

A resident who was charged with owning a vicious dog and letting it run at large, told the court the dog had been destroyed and the case was dismissed on consent of the complainant Tillman Landry. The dog bit Landry's young son a few days ago.

Dundas Resident Sentenced To Three Years For Theft

GEORGETOWN—A resident of Dundas, Harris Leslie Blackett, was sentenced to three years in Dorchester Penitentiary by Stipendiary Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, Q.C.

He was convicted of breaking into the store of Randolph Jenkins, Annandale, and stealing a watch and several small articles. He was tried at Souris on July

22nd and remanded for sentence until yesterday.

He has previously served two terms in the penitentiary and had been released only last February.

In other cases on the docket, a resident of Cardigan was fined \$20 and costs for being intoxicated in a public place. A Montague resident charged with driving while intoxicated was further remanded and his case adjourned to Aug. 5th.

A resident of Glen William was fined \$10 and costs for not having an operator's license for the current year, and a resident of Newport was fined \$10 for driving without due care and attention.

A Lower Montague resident was fined \$5 and costs when he pleaded guilty to throwing a missile, in this case a pop bottle within the town of Montague. A resident of Abney was fined \$20 for having liquor in a place other than his residence, and a resident of Murray Harbour was fined \$25 for having liquor which had not been purchased at a vendors.

A resident of Moncton, N.B. charged with angling without a licence was fined \$10 and an additional three dollars for the cost of a non-resident fishing license.

Jan M. MacLeod, crown prosecutor for Kings represented the crown in all cases.

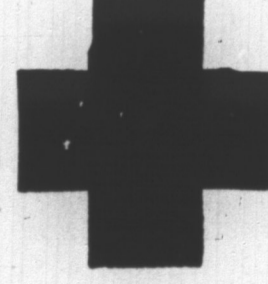
