Hees Suggests Construction And Aid Cut

COBBOURG, Ont. (CP)—Conservative MP George Hees says here federal spending on construction and foreign aid should be slashed to combat inflation.

Sizeable cuts in spending would reduce the need for a tax increase, he told the Progressive Conservative Association of Cobourg in his Northumberland riding.

Mr. Hees predicted that Finance Minister Sharp will announce a \$300,000,000 tax increase next month. This would "feed the fires of inflation" at a time when the government was asking Canadians to reduce their expenditures.

He criticized Mr. Sharp for cutting back expenditures on research and told the promised \$10,000,000-a-year university scholarship plan.

DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS Province of Prince Edward Island NOTICE BUILDING NEAR HIGHWAY Section 41 of the Roads Act, 1965, reads as follows: (1) No person shall, without a written permit from the Minister, erect any building at a distance of less than 50 feet from the boundary of any highway or road, nor shall any such building be erected at a distance of less than fifty feet from those of the next adjoining owner. (2) No person shall, without a written permit from the Minister, erect any building, structure, sign or billboard, at a distance of less than two hundred feet from the point of intersection of any intersecting roads or highways or at a point less than two hundred feet from the point of intersection of a road or highway with a railroad. (3) No person shall, without a written permit from the Minister erect at or near a curve or bend in a road or highway any building, structure, sign or billboard which may obstruct or interfere in any manner with a clear view of traffic on the said road or highway or which would result in a reduction of the actual sight of traffic on the said road or highway to less than one thousand feet. (4) The Minister upon receiving application for such permit may grant or refuse such permit and his decision to grant or refuse the permit shall be final and conclusive. (5) This section shall not apply to any incorporated city, town, incorporated village or to any area in which the Regulations of the Town Planning Act apply. GEORGE J.
