## Agreement Appears Stalled For Dominican Settlement

**SANTO DOMINGO (CP)**—A political solution to the strife in the Dominican Republic appeared stalled Tuesday night after 10 days of intensive negotiations seeking to bring the Dominican rebels and the rival civilian-military junta into a coalition.

U.S. officials, announcing President Johnson's special envoy, McGeorge Bundy, will return to Washington today, said agreement on a coalition appeared far off, but added that both sides had agreed that any new government must be strongly anti-Communist. Both sides also had expressed abhorrence of any right-wing dictatorship, the officials said.

Brig. Gen. Antonio Imbert Barrera, chief of the right-wing "reconstruction" government, called for the creation of a provisional legislative council with out elections. Executive power would remain with his five-man junta.

Imbert in a public memorandum accused the U.S., the United Nations and the Organization of American States of "open interference" in Dominican affairs.

He said the UN and OAS political formulas for ending the month-old civil war, which has led to 21,000 United States troops being landed in the republic, were "mistaken" since they all insist on the formation of new governments.

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## Astronaut Plans To Leave Ship

**HOUSTON, Tex (AP)** — The Manned Spacecraft Centre confirmed Tuesday that astronaut Edward H. White II will leave his spacecraft completely during the approaching four-day Gemini flight.

Dr. Robert R. Gilruth, manned spacecraft director, said at a press conference that White, if conditions are favorable, will open the right-hand hatch of his spacecraft and float 25 feet into space at the end of a tether.

Gilruth said White, a 34-year-old U.S. Air Force major, will be in space 22 minutes beginning in the second orbit over Hawaii.

The launching is scheduled for June 3. Nearly 10 minutes of the activity will be completely outside the spacecraft. The decision was delayed until Tuesday, Gilruth said, so final qualification tests could be completed on the spacecraft, space suit, individual life support and objectives in the broadcasts.

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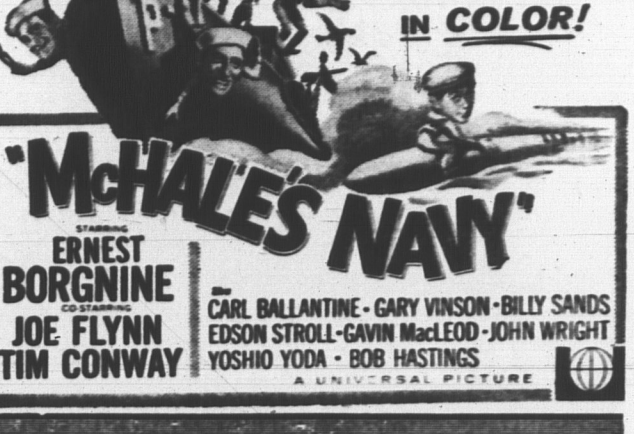

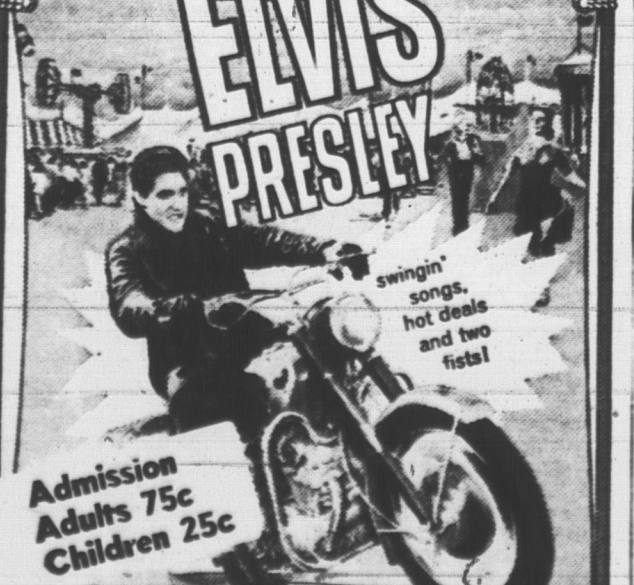
