**THE CAMPAIGN**

Will be short. But if our friends make a judicious selection of candidates and work together harmoniously, unitedly and vigorously we feel certain of victory FOR THE WHOLE SIX.

For want of organization and a Leader, we have already lost some precious time; and in Queen's County the enemy are first in the field. This advantage will be over come by prompt and judicious action. A great deal depends upon the Convention to be held in Charlottetown on Tuesday next. We hope our friends in the country will at once choose their delegates; and that there may be a full representation of the Liberal-Conservatives of Queen's County.

**Representation in the Cabinet!**

THERE is no action of the Government which has so touched the hearts of the people of this Island as their noble treatment of the Hon. James C. Pope. Mr. Pope has been unable, on account of his malady, to attend to the duties of his office for more than a year. Yet another Minister (the Hon. Mr. McLellan) has performed his duties, and he is allowed to retain his position, while the burdens of the country are not thereby increased a cent. The tie which binds the great majority of our people to the person and Government of Sir John A. Macdonald has, we believe, been greatly strengthened by this noble conduct; and, we have no doubt, that the assurance (which comes from undoubted authority) that the Island will continue to be represented in the Cabinet will add to Sir John's great popularity here.

**Nuts for the Grit Candidates.**

THE Grit candidates for Queen's County are in the field. They are the Hon. David Laird, and Louis H. Davies, Esq. Those who nominated them of course deem them the strongest men for the struggle. Their record is pretty well known to the electors. Further on in the campaign, we may have occasion to refer to it. At the onset we meet them with these two simple statements of their own leaders; and, on behalf of the people of Prince Edward Island we demand an explanation:

"FOR PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND THE RECEIPTS WERE \$1,596,000, THE EXPENDITURE \$2,624,000—THE DEFICIT (THAT IS THE LOSS TO CANADA) \$10,270,000."—Hon. Edward Blake, Leader of the Opposition. See Hansard, 1880.

"I think we have done very well by the Island, and we have carried out the Terms of Union to the utmost possible extent."—Hon. MACKENZIE, May, 1882.

The electors of the Island are certainly entitled to a satisfactory analysis of these statements. Their tone, tenor, force, significance ought, before the election day, to be fully and clearly understood by all.

Did Mr. Blake speak the truth when he said in effect that the Island had received up to 1880 \$1,027,000 more from Canada than in justice she ought to have received?

Did Mr. Mackenzie speak the truth when he said "we have carried out the terms of Union to the utmost possible extent?"

Nor will she be forgotten on the Republican soil, beyond our borders. From this American continent, regardless of political distinctions, will ascend, on this anniversary occasion, an ardent prayer that the noblest of women and the best of Queens may long reign over her people.

Away, across the wide Pacific, on the one hand; beyond the Atlantic, the Mediterranean and the Indian Ocean, on the other; from sea-girt isle and mainland—sea-washed or far from shore—the remembrance of the providential escape of Her Majesty from peril, will give deeper and fresher significance to the time-honored words whenever and wherever said or sung—"GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!"

Blake Abandons Free Trade.

Ultra Grits Dismayed

They cannot get Candidates in Montreal.

Mr. Costigan raised to the Ministry.

Magnificent Liberal-Conservative Demonstration.

OTTAWA, May 24.

It is understood that Prince Edward Island will continue to be represented in the present Government.

The official returns show that the proportion of the Island's Saving's Bank deposit, per head of the population, is large. Four additional post offices are to be opened.

In the address to the electors, the Leader of the Opposition (Mr. Blake) abandons free trade for moderate protection. The address has caused consternation and dismay in the ranks of ultra Grits.

It is reported that Mr. Cartwright will refuse nomination as a candidate, or will issue a counter address.

The Grits are unable to procure a single candidate for Montreal. Every person they have named as a fitting person to bear the Grit standard in the leading commercial city has declined.

The Opposition admit that the Redistribution of Seats Bill will cost them twelve seats in Ontario. Yet the Bill is based on the principle of representation by population.

The appointment of Mr. Costigan as Minister of Inland Revenue is very popular. Costigan goes to Toronto to-night, to speak, at the request of the Irish electors. He brings great strength to the ministry.

There was a magnificent Liberal-Conservative demonstration last night at Three Rivers.

Hon. Mr. Langevin, Minister of Public Works, will not be opposed.

OTTAWA, May 25.

E. J. Hodgson, Esq., arrived here from Washington on Sunday night. While here he was the guest of Sir John A. Macdonald. He left for home last night.

Mr. Joseph Pope has been appointed Private Secretary to Sir John A. Macdonald.

Mr. Porter has been nominated the Conservative candidate for Centre Huron—Cartwright's constituency—and Mr. Hall has been unanimously chosen for Sherbrooke. There is no Grit opposing him.

The readjustment of Bothwell leaves Philosopher Mills' chance of election hopeless. The election of Mr. Hawkins (Conservative) in his stead is conceded by all parties.

Six steamers are now coming up the Gulf of St. Lawrence carrying five thousand British Emigrants bound for the Northwest.

Henry Lyman, of Montreal, the largest Wholesale Druggist in the Dominion, and a life-long Reformer, writes to the Mail giving reasons for supporting the National Policy—though not directly affecting his business. The Globe has attacked him.

OTTAWA, May 23.

The meeting at the Canadian Institute last evening was a grand success. The veteran Premier received a perfect ovation and his stirring and statesmanlike address was received with rapturous applause. In his address he put the reasons of dissolution and the issue before the electors as follows: "Our tenure of office would not have ended, the Parliament would have lasted until October, 1883, and we, the Government of Canada, we the fourteen ministers who govern the policy of Canada, might have been enjoying our salaries and holding our positions until a year from next October. We have surrendered them and why? Because we thought it was of the greatest consequence to Canada and to the future prosperity of the manufacturing interests of Canada that the whole country should have an opportunity of expressing their opinion whether our policy is wise or not." (Cheers.) A good many manufacturers have been established, and various industries have been commenced, but they would have been quadrupled. Four times as many manufactures would have been started in Canada if it were not for the Grit declarations that the policy of 1878 would be destroyed and upset by a free trade parliament in 1883. (Cheers.) Capitalists are anxious to retain the N. P. You know capitalists who have hoarded up their money, who have got their money with great pains and during a lifetime of saving, are timid. Capitalists are always timid. Many men here, and in England as well, as I have been over to England every summer for the last three years, say: "You are starting manufactures, and under very auspicious circumstances, but how long will that last? We may send our money over; we may have our mills going on; we may take our machinery over there and spend hundreds and thousands of dollars in doing so; we may bring out skilled laborers to teach your people to make these things; but by the voice of the people declaring that they do not approve of the policy, that they wish to reverse and return to free trade again, all our money will be gone, and we have no assurance that the policy will be lasting. We find that this is so, and we desire that the people may at once declare whether they wish to have fair trade, plenty of work and prosperity, or free trade, want of labor and poverty. (Cheers.) We place that fairly before the people, and say if you want to reverse that policy, do so. If you want a continuance of prosperity

declare so at the polls and you will have five years ahead during which that policy cannot be reversed. We have had three years now, and at the end of five years more the manufacturing interests will be so strong that, as in the United States, it will be able to fight its own battles. And their is no fear of that policy being reversed to ruin the manufacturer who has put his money, his means, his credit, and his capital into such enterprises. (Cheers.) It is for you to say whether that policy shall be carried out or not.

Able addresses were also made by Sir Leonard Tilley and Mr. Costigan and the candidates.

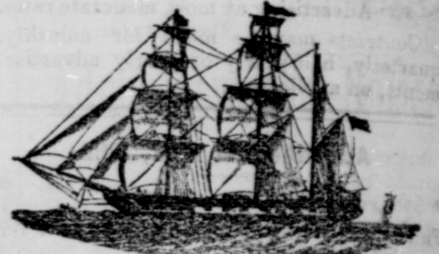
