DISCUSS EGG PRICE

The government supports butter at 30 cents a pound wholesale, eggs at 30 cents a dozen for grade A large, and pork at 23 cents a pound for grade A carcasses.

COULD EXPORT BUTTER

A federal report estimated the government held or stored 77,000,000 pounds of butter on Nov. 20 and Mr. Nollet suggested Canada may have about 100,000,000 pounds of surplus butter which Canadians would not buy even if the price is cut by half.
