THOUGHTS FOR OUR TIME

WE MAY SHARE THE VICTORY OVER SIN

One of the more difficult Christian doctrines for men of our generation to accept, is that of original sin. We are told, on the authority of God Himself that, prior to the reception of the revivifying Sacrament of Baptism, our natures are tainted by a sin committed, not by ourselves, but by our first parents, many centuries ago.

Moreover, even after the reception of Baptism, we find ourselves all too prone to return to the state of sin. And this fact, too is attributed to the weakness of a nature which, having once, in the person of Adam, alienated itself from its divine source of being and strength, has never been able to regain its pristine perfection.

Why, we are naturally inclined to ask, should you and I be made to suffer for a sin committed by someone else? We can understand that our first parents should have to accept the consequences of their sin. And we are also ready to admit that we deserve punishment for any sin which we commit. Each individual is accountable to God for his own acts. But why should Adam's descendants share the sin of Adam, a sin which they themselves never committed?

We do not claim here that we are going to be able to answer this question in such a way that every reader will feel completely satisfied. The reason is that we are children of our own times and our own culture and the answer which must be given, is rather foreign to our usual way of thinking.

The answer is that we are all

possessed of the same nature, which we have derived ultimately from our first parents. And, by virtue of this community of nature, we are joined in a certain unity, a certain solidarity. We men are not merely a group of independent and isolated individuals — we are a society of interdependent persons.

This truth is evident enough, and clear enough, insofar as it goes. The difficulty comes when we insist (as we must, if our participation in the effects of original sin is to make sense), that we are even, in some real sense, morally and religiously interdependent.

We recognize that we are dependent upon our parents for our existence, and that we even yet depend greatly upon our fellow men for our food, clothing, comforts, etc. We are also dependent upon our ancestors for the accumulation of wisdom and knowledge, which makes life as we know it possible.

However, when it comes to the moral sphere, we feel that each of us is totally accountable, and solely accountable, for what wills and merits. My fellow man may seek to help me, or to hinder me; but what counts is only how I react to that help or that hindrance. No one can merit for me what I deserve, by way of reward or punishment, is owing only to my own actions.

ELEVATE SOUL

Significantly for the religious sphere, my prayer would seem to gain nothing, by being joined to the prayers of others. What counts is that I elevate my soul to God. Indeed, I think that most of us tend to regard ourselves as most closely united to God, when we are far from the distracting presence of our fellow men.

In moral and religious matters, then, we tend to look upon ourselves merely as individuals,

History Takes Up Attention of Mining Group

QUEBEC (CP)—Canada's history rather than its mining took over in interest Friday as delegates to the month-long Commonwealth Mining and Metallurgical Congress toured this ancient city.

A number of tours to historic or scenic spots were available and most of the delegates took advantage of them.

Those still thirsting for mining, metallurgical or geological knowledge had choices of visits to the various sections of Quebec's department of mines or Laval University's mining school.

From here the delegates split into a number of parties and won't be together as a full group again until they meet in Halifax Tuesday for the final ceremonies of the congress Tuesday and Wednesday.

Some left Friday night for northern New Brunswick and will break up into further groups for visits to mining developments in the areas of Bathurst and Newcastle. Others will leave today for a one-day aerial visit to the operations of Iron Ore Company of Canada at Knob Lake in the Ungava area of Quebec.

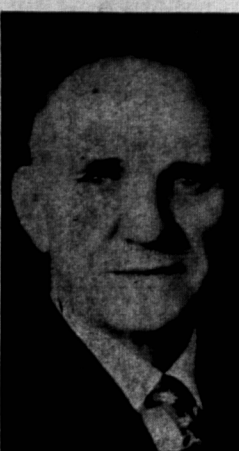
All will converge on Moncton during the weekend. From there some will proceed to Sydney, N.S., to inspect operations of Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation. Others will proceed by air to Newfoundland.

In Newfoundland, all delegates will visit St. John's but some will go to the Wabana iron-ore operations of Dominion Steel and Coal and, and others to mining operations at Buchan's.

August Trade Deficit Down

OTTAWA (CP) — A slight 2.4 per cent rise in Canadian commodity exports during August, compared with a year earlier, helped whittle down the August trade deficit to \$33,900,000 from \$46,600,000 last year.

The bureau of statistics, issuing preliminary figures Friday, reported that the decrease did not offset higher deficits earlier in the year, and the first eight months the cumulative deficit—excess of imports over exports—was \$643,600,000 compared with \$640,100,000 year earlier.

Exports in August rose to \$437,400,000 from \$427,100,000 a year earlier. Imports were practically unchanged at \$473,300,000 compared to \$473,700,000.

Exports in the January-August period rose to \$3,217,300,000 from \$3,161,400,000 while imports increased to \$3,860,000,000 from \$3,801,500,000.
