

Montague Fire Dept. Monthly Meeting Held

At the regular monthly meeting of the Montague Fire Department held in the town hall last night, it was decided by unanimous vote that all members of the department be requested to take a first aid course. The suggestion was made by Gilbert Clements, who stated that a knowledge of first aid fundamentals was vital to the members of the department because lives can be quickly administered at the scene of a fire.

Mr. Clements went on to say that he and fellow fireman, John Shaw, would be happy to instruct a first aid class made up of firemen and anyone else who might be interested in it, and that the remuneration he would receive for it from the Red Cross, would be used to purchase a respirator for the department. Mr. Clements and Mr. Shaw are both qualified instructors.

A number of reports were heard. Ralph Beck reported that the three new insurance policies were reviewed by his committee and complete details of these will be brought to the next meeting for close study.

Gilbert Clements reported that after surveying the project he estimated that 7,000 ft. of wire would be needed to install alarm bells in the individual homes of the firemen, and that he would report on an estimated cost of the wire at the next meeting.

It was also reported that rubberized pliers had been purchased and Fred Vuozzo's suggestion that portable hand lights were needed by the department was approved by vote and a committee was appointed to look after the matter.

Following the meeting films on fire fighting and fire precautions were shown by Claude Nicholson.
