The former beauty queen contestant from Hilo wasn't sorry at all about the trip. "It was wonderful," she said. "I'd like to do it again — only legally."

Joycelin's plan for a mainland honeymoon with a boy friend identified only as "Bill" ended just outside the Long Beach breakwater. A U. S. Coast Guard fireboat came along side the Athabaskan and the pretty stowaway climbed down a Jacob's ladder.
