ness of the soil thus allowing more bacterial activity for the legumes.

It supplies two essential plant foods: calcium, and magnesium if it is dolomitic.

It promotes decay of organic matter and increases the supply of nitrates.

It reduces fixation of phosphorus applied as fertilizers.

It counteracts soil toxins, such as aluminum, and helps to control many plant diseases.

It improves the tilth or granular structure and takes the stickiness out of clays.

As a filler in mixed fertilizers, it counteracts the acid reaction of ammonia fertilizers.

In fewer words, lime helps make fertilizers more efficient and improves the quality of vegetables and fodders.

**THE pH OF SOILS**

Before attempting a liming program every farmer should want to know his soil requirements and have a soil test made by a competent technician. Most reports will be in terms of pH and calcium (lime) required to neutralize the soil acidity in the arable portion or plow depth (6" to 7"). To many, pH is a puzzle. This is simply a method of expressing the intensity of the acidity or alkalinity of solutions and consists of a scale of 14 units, subdivided into tenths.

The centre figure, pH 7, is called "neutral," so that all above 7 are increasingly alkaline or basic, and all below 7 are increasingly acid, each unit representing ten times the previous one in intensity. Example: pH 4 is ten times as acid as pH 5 or one hundred times pH 6. Conversely, pH 10 is ten times as alkaline as pH 9 or one hundred times pH 8, and so on. As most virgin soils in the Maritime Provinces originally range from about pH 4.3 to 5.6, one can easily understand why so much lime is required.

All crops, however, do not respond equally to liming.

**LIVESTOCK MINERALS**

From what is heard in the question period at livestock meetings, the difference between mineral mixtures and conditioners is not clearly understood. These are two distinct products as explained below:

**Mineral Mixtures** - Whether a mineral mixture is home made or a commercial one it is composed of ingredients to supply extra calcium and phosphorus for the ration, plus iron, iodine, cobalt and other minerals in some cases. As a general rule of thumb, says Dr. Ballantyne, every livestockman in Alberta should be feeding a mineral mixture in addition to salt. The purpose is to aid in building good bone structure, promote growth and economical gains, help prevent rickets, sterility, and keep the body functioning in a healthy manner.

**Conditioners** - A conditioner is a more complex mixture of ingredients composed of various minerals, and appetizers. It could be called a tonic but it is not a replacer for minerals. The main use for conditioners is to help animals that are or have been sick to get back into healthy condition. To do so the primary cause of the disease has to be treated first. For example, feeding a conditioner to wormy or mangy pigs will not restore them to health unless the parasite is eliminated first.

A livestockman is well advised to discuss the matter with his district agriculturist or veterinarian to be sure he is using the right product and the most economical one for the needs of his

**COURSE PLANNED**

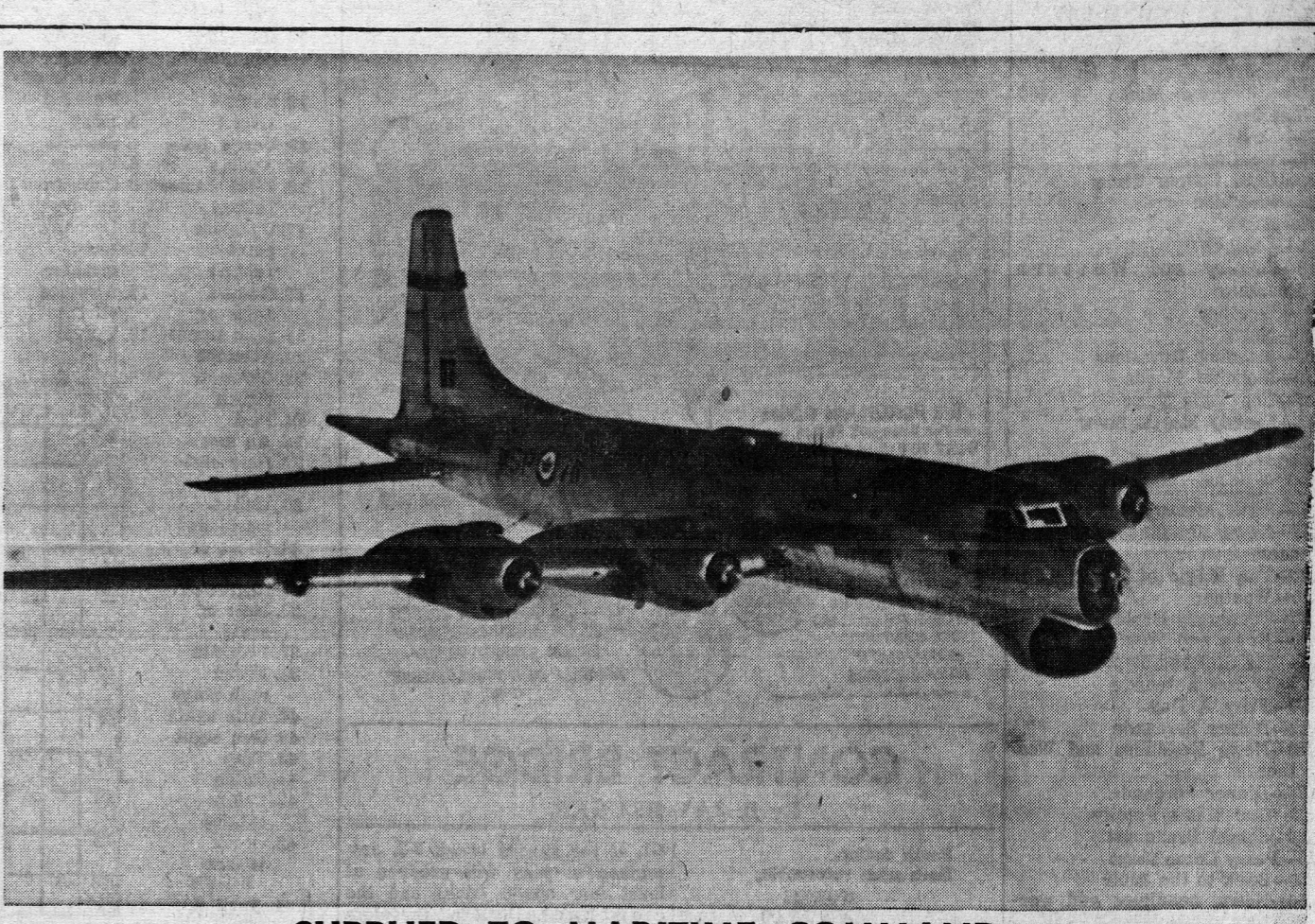
