Ont. Member Addresses Meeting In O'Leary

Mr. Donald A. Fleming, M.P., Progressive Conservative member for Toronto-Eglinton addressed a very largely attended Conservative meeting in the Verdun Theatre, O'Leary, last night. Mr. Fleming is known as a forceful speaker and debater in the House of Commons and met with tremendous applause from the large audience in attendance. Mr. Gus Peters, president of the West Prince Progressive Conservative Association, presided. Mr. J. H. Price, Conservative candidate for Prince County introduced the special speaker and in a short address, said that if elected one of his first projects to be undertaken would be the improvement of communications with the mainland and the establishing of a ferry boat crossing at West Point. Mr. Fleming said how pleased he was to be back once again on Prince Edward Island and speaking on behalf of Mr. Price regarding his listeners that their candidate had only been defeated by 150 votes in the last general election, a situation that he expected to be reversed on this occasion. Speaking of a shortage of hydro electric power across Canada he stated that when atomic energy is developed commercially, Prince Edward Island must be one of the first provinces to benefit. In his speech Mr. Fleming scored the government for high taxes, loss of export markets and the extravagance and waste of the rearmament program, quoting many excerpts from the Currie report. Dr. L. G. Dewar also addressed the meeting. Present on the platform were J. W. Don Campbell, M.L.A.; Dr. L. G. Hubert Gaudet, M.L.A.; Dr. L. G. Dewar, and Pat Morris, president of the East Prince Progressive Conservative Association.

Interest-Free Loans For Nova Scotia Fishermen

HALIFAX, (CP)—Nova Scotia lobster fishermen now may apply for interest-free loans to replace gear swept away by storms and ice, it was announced Monday. The loan program, financed by the federal and provincial governments, covers damages suffered by fishermen in some districts on the southwestern coast, Cape Breton and Northumberland Strait. The joint statement did not name the districts. A maximum loan will cover 75 per cent of the traps lost, or 150 traps multiplied by the estimated unit cost per trap.
