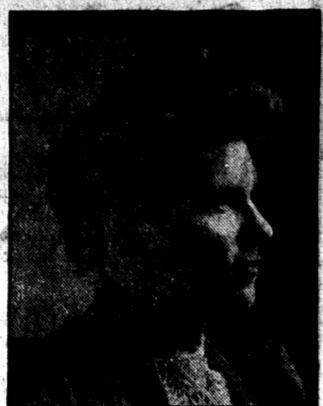

TORONTO'S TAXATION

TORONTO, May 7.—The draft estimates for the city, as prepared by Treasurer Coody, in pamphlet form, were issued Saturday afternoon. The total amount to be dealt with affected by taxation is \$4,471,971. Of this amount \$1,407,007 was raised by revenue other than taxation, and \$3,064,964 by taxation, requiring the imposition of a rate of 18 1/2 mills on the dollar.

INTERFERENCE IS NOT WANTED

DURBAN, May 10.—C. J. Smythe, the premier of Natal speaking at Nottingham road, totally rejected the suggestion that imperial troops should be requisitioned to assist in suppressing the present outbreak. He would be very sorry to see Natal ask for such assistance.

From the moment that assistance was given the imperial government would take charge and the settlement would be removed from Natal's hands. As an example of imperial mistakes, Mr. Smythe mentioned the repatriation of Dinisulu from St. Helena. Though Dinisulu was only the chief of a small tribe, the natives he said, did not forget that he belonged to the blood royal.

Colonel Greener, Mr. Smythe's colleague in the representation of the Lion's River division, said that the recrudescence of the native trouble was due to the imperial government's suspension of the executive of natives, which had impaired Natal's authority in the eyes of the natives.

Colonel Mackenzie, the officer who led the column which effected the capture of the murderers of the Sub-Inspector Hunt, said that Natal had now had quite enough of imperial interference. "Heaven help us," he added, "if there is any more."
