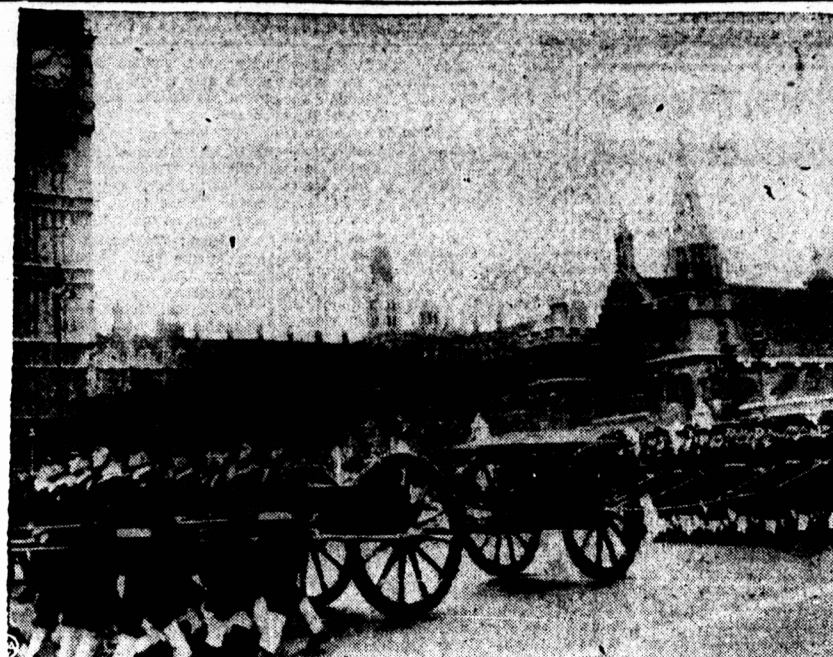

Curling History Made Yesterday At Montague

History was made at the Montague Curling Rink yesterday afternoon when the local lady curlers played hosts to two teams from Charlottetown for the first lady curling exhibition game to be played here. Having been chartered for almost thirty years, this is the first season in which the club has had a ladies' adjunct, and one which has added a great deal of interest in the club, since the ladies have taken to curling as if they had grown up with the game. And they are good too, as several gentlemen spectators remarked yesterday, so good that it might be interesting to have them take on a men's team later in the season.

The afternoon game on the west ice ended 10-5 for Charlottetown, skipped by Velma Mellish. The locals, led by Gertrude Power, captured the first two ends with a one and two count, and the fourth end with two points, but the Charlottetown quartette dominated the latter half of the game after tying the score in the third end with three counters, taking the last four ends with two singletons, a brace and a triple. On the east ice the results were reversed with the win going to Montague 12-4, skipped by Jean MacDonald. The losers, skipped by Elizabeth MacDonald, captured only two ends scoring two on the fourth and two more on the eighth. Miss MacDonald led her team to victory scoring the first three ends and the fifth, sixth and seventh.

The ice was quite fast, with good draws for both turns, and the Charlottetown ladies soon became accustomed to the different style of ice to their own artificial ice in Charlottetown. The skips played a close guarding game on the ice, but took advantage of the breaks to lay more biters on the outside circles which ran up three ends.

In the short space of time in which the ladies of both clubs have been curling, they have developed excellent form, and are careful to take the broom, and have a fine sense of tee weight which accounted for some very fine shots yesterday. Declined Honor

TORONTO, Feb. 14—(CP)—Montreal's Mayor Camillien Houde has declined the honor of being Canada's "best-dressed civic dignitary," it was learned yesterday. When the Men's Fashion Council of Canada announces Canada's best-dressed men for 1952 at its annual dinners in Montreal tonight Mayor Houde's name won't be on the list. The spot will be taken by President Norman MacKenzie of the University of British Columbia, as best-dressed man in educational circles. He was 11th in line. Mayor Houde declined the honor saying, "I'm not that kind of competitor." The rotund Mayor said he was "just not built for that sort of thing, mentally or physically."

Max Bell, publisher of the Calgary Albertan, was named as an "Eminent Western Dandy." A second newspaper man, Thomas Drummond, president and publisher of the Saint John Telegraph-Journal, also was on the list as a "Conservative Maritimer." Canada's new Governor-General, Rt. Hon. Vincent Massey, was chosen as exemplifying "Gentlemanly Restraint." Senator Rupert Davies, President of the Kingston Whig-Standard who now is in Wales, was selected for his "individuality." Mr. Justice E. R. E. Cheverie of the Supreme Court of Ontario was cited for "immaculate propriety." External Affairs Minister L. B. Pearson was given the title "Debonair Always."

WINNIPEG, Feb. 14—(CP)—Most prices reacted to lower levels in the last half of trading today on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange when United States markets turned lower.

Early in the trade, prices here had moved up for moderate gains, but these advances were reduced or erased when American markets fell, prompting increased selling at Winnipeg. Flax showed the widest decline.

Export loadings of Canadian wheat included 765,000 bushels for the United Kingdom and 185,000 for the Republic of Ireland. Class two wheat and I.W.A. prices were unchanged from yesterday.
