HIGHLY HONORED BY  
THEIR QUEEN.**

**Received, Dined and  
Wined at Windsor.**

**Demonstrative Enthusiasm of  
the English People.**

**CANADIANS SAIL FOR HOME  
ON THE 11TH.**

LONDON, Dec. 1.—The officers and men of the Canadian regiment went out to Windsor yesterday and were received by the Queen. On their arrival at Windsor station the Canadians were welcomed by the Mayor. Large crowds had assembled and gave the men a rousing reception. The Queen inspected the officers in the quadrangle of the Castle and expressed her happiness on seeing them. She regretted the heavy casualties that had occurred in their ranks since the war began. Her Majesty thanked her subjects from Canada for the great service they had rendered Great Britain in South Africa, and wished them a safe return to their homes. Colonel Otter said that his officers and men were proud to render service to their beloved Queen and the Empire over which she reigned. They were proud to serve the flag under which they were born, lived and hoped to die. Each officer of the regiment was presented individually to Her Majesty who conversed with them for a moment or two. Private B. R. Armstrong, of New Brunswick, was also presented to the Queen. Private Armstrong lost one of his legs while fighting. Her Majesty spoke in the most sympathetic way to the unfortunate fellow. The men afterwards dined in the Riding School of the Castle, while the officers had the honor of being invited to luncheon in the famous Castle Home of Britain's Queen itself. When the time came for the party to return to London an immense throng had gathered, and it became so demonstrative at times that they rushed into the ranks and grasped the Canadians by their hands and the parade became disorganized. Others, more wildly enthusiastic, endeavored to wrench the shoulder straps and regimental letters from the clothing of the men, as mementoes of the occasion. The police were unable to keep the crowd back, and numbers dashed through the lines into the station and gave the Canadians a wildly exuberant send off. The band played and crowds sang "Auld Lang Syne." Colonel Otter, Lieutenant-Colonel Buchan and Captain Macdonald remained at the Castle by command of the Queen to dine with Her Majesty and Royal Family last evening. The Canadians will sail from Liverpool on December 11th for Halifax.

**OUR BANKS.**

**Half Yearly Distribution of Dividends.**

MONTREAL, Dec. 1.—This is half yearly dividend day with three city banks. The Bank of Montreal leads with \$600,000, representing five per cent on its capital stock of \$12,000,000. The Mercantile Bank of Canada pays out \$210,000 on its \$6,000,000, at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent. The Hochelaga Bank is the third local bank paying dividends at this point, the amount being \$52,500 at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent. on its capital stock of \$1,500,000. The outside banks paying dividends now are the Ontario bank, \$250,000; the Quebec bank, \$75,000; the Canadian Bank of Commerce and Bank of Toronto.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—The War Office announces that Lord Roberts handed over the command of the British troops in South Africa yesterday to Lord Kitchener. It is further announced that the Queen approves of Lord Kitchener's promotion to Lieutenant-General with the rank of General while in command in South Africa. Lord Kitchener is the youngest Lieutenant-General in the British army.

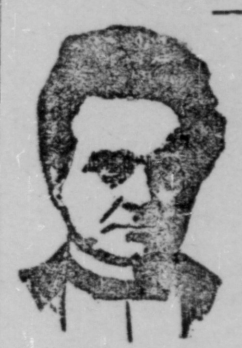
