(Moncton Times, April 23) Mr. David Evans, highly respected resident of Buctouche, died in the City Hospital yesterday morning after having been a patient in the institution the last six days. He was well known throughout the district in which he lived and held the esteem and respect of a wide circle of friends. When a young man he entered the employ of the late J. D. Irving and remained with him and later with Irving Estate until the time of his death which terminated forty years of faithful service.

PIGEON RACES TO BE STAGED

(Canadian Press) CALGARY, April 24—Members of the Calgary Homing Pigeon Club are getting their racing birds in shape for a series of North-to-South races to be staged this year. The course will be from the North West Territories to Calgary. There will be races to Calgary from Fort Chipewyan, Fort Providence and Fort Norman, marking the first time in history homing pigeons have been raced over this far-north route. Fort Chipewyan is 607 miles from in length, should be nailed together to form a square like a box with neither bottom nor lid. Over this square wire netting should be fixed.
