Montreal Suburb Rioting Ceases

MONTREAL (CP)—No incidents were reported during the weekend in suburban Lafèche following reading of the Riot Act Friday by Mayor Alexandre Girard.

In addition to 18 regular policemen, special constables were sworn in to enforce the edict the mayor said he imposed because a telephone caller told him former police chief Georges Beaulne and some friends wanted to take over the police department.

The move was made on the eve of a Quebec provincial trusteeship over the troubled community of 12,000 on the south shore of the St. Lawrence River opposite Montreal Island.

Cancer Problem Is Discussed

VICTORIA (CP)—Cancer research has reached a point similar to that in 1952 in the development of the atomic bomb says a cancer expert.

Dr. J. W. Jull, associate professor at the University of British Columbia's Cancer Research Centre, told a meeting his experiments suggest that scientists may develop a cancer treatment which—like a homing torpedo—finds its way to cancer cells and destroys them.

During the last 15 years Dr. Jull has produced 30 publications and his research into cancer suggests that a steroid hormone can be used to carry certain chemical groupings to cancerous areas of the body.

But he stressed his findings have not yet been corroborated.

"I should stress that what I have been saying is to a large extent speculative and remains to be shown to be predictable," he said.

He added that even if he should be proved to be correct "we shouldn't have cured all forms of cancer by any means."

India's Food Crisis Mounts

NEW DELHI (AP)—Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri's government is beset by a mounting food crisis and a Communist scheme to capitalize on it, raising fears a wave of violence will sweep India's hungry millions.

With the food situation already explosive and unrelenting, the pro-Moscow leader of India's splintered Communist party said Friday a nationwide demonstration will be staged next month to protest sharp price rises and short supplies of wheat, rice and other basic items.

S. A. A. Dange, chairman of the Communist Party of India, which lost about 40 per cent of its membership last April in a split with the pro-Peking Communist, told reporters the mass agitation effort will be launched Aug. 24-28.

"A government which cannot feed the people must quit," Dange said.

He said the pro-Chinese Communists and all other opposition elements will be invited to join the protest against the government's failure to check food prices.

With Indian Communist ranks split and famine threatening some remote regions, the pro-Moscow boss clearly is trying to use the food situation and empty stomachs to make trouble for Shastri's government.

Authoritative sources said government leaders are worried a Communist-led protest next month might touch off widespread bloodshed. They said a major effort is planned to increase food supplies and lower prices before the demonstration.

FORBIDS GATHERINGS
The Riot Act forbids meetings of more than three persons either outside or inside houses and imposes a 9 p.m. curfew on cars. Persons convicted of an offence under the act are liable of life imprisonment.

Meanwhile, a Lafèche councillor who supported mayor Girard in his council dispute started a year prison term during the week-end for accepting a \$3,000 bribe in connection with a hospital request for rezoning.

The Quebec Court of Appeals upheld the conviction of Councillor Leo Hahnault on a corruption charge Thursday. Ex-chief Beaulne played a key part in the apprehension of the councillor.

This took place shortly before he was suspended by Mayor Girard.

but every time they hired him, Mayor Girard dismissed him.

The aldermen said there was no need to read the Riot Act because the community has been calm in recent days.

Mayor Girard said the telephone caller, whom he refused to identify, told him of a gathering of 26 to 28 men at the Beaulne residence Friday afternoon.

Ex-chief Beaulne said the mayor's decision to read the Riot Act was "ridiculous."

His wife told reporters there were 10 persons at her home Friday, four of them children and that the three men present were her husband, a friend and a tenant.

Pierre Laporte, Quebec municipal affairs minister, said in an interview Saturday that the Lafèche disputants should show a minimum of good faith while

As soon as Shastri took office June 9 after the death of Prime Minister Nehru, he announced his government would put top priority on attacking the food shortage and spiralling prices. It was during a meeting here of the state governors June 26 on the food situation Shastri suffered a mild heart attack and the problem has worsened since then.

After resting a few days, Shastri plans to return to his desk today. He has called a cabinet meeting and the food situation is said to be at the top of the agenda.
