The Dock W. I. held its April meeting at the home of Mrs. Howard Clark. The creed was followed by roll call, minutes and correspondence.

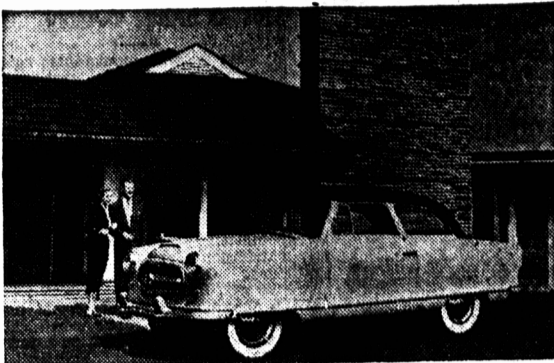

Today that prophecy has all but come true, and while it is to be regretted that the automobile has chucked up more deaths and accidents on our highways than there would seem to be any sane reason for, it has enabled our farmers and city folk to enjoy more of the good things in life. I would like to see a new era of water recreation and travel like we used to enjoy some forty years ago.
