

Librarian Dies In Dentist Chair

MONTREAL, (CP) — Marjorie Comeau, 24-year-old librarian and performer at radiostat ion CJAD, died Saturday under an anaesthetic in a dentist's chair.

Harry Lashley, the dentist, and Dr. Wesley Bourne, who administered the anaesthetic, said the woman's breathing and pulse became irregular shortly after she fell asleep in the chair. Two other doctors were called but artificial respiration failed to revive her.

Ms. Comeau came to Montreal four years ago from Saint John, N. B. In addition to her duties in the library, she took part in a number of broadcasts. She had celebrated her 24th birthday Thursday.

The body was sent to Saint John for burial.

TERROR AT THE CIRCUS IN WB CINEMASCOPE PIC

Cinemascope goes to the circus in "Ring of Fear," the new Wayne-Fellows production for Warner Bros. which opens today at the Prince Edward Theatre.

Mickey Spillane, world famous as the creator of Mike Hammer stories, makes his screen debut in "Ring of Fear," playing himself. Spillane's success story is an amazing one. From the publication of his first novel, "I, The Jury" through "The Big Kill" and others, his books have sold more than sixty million copies and have been translated into eleven languages.

Heading the supporting cast are Sean McClory, Marian Carr and John Bromfield. McClory, a native of Ireland and alumnus of the world-renowned Abbey Theatre, has his most important role to date as the murderer in "Ring of Fear." Miss Carr and John Bromfield are teamed romantically in "Ring of Fear" as daredevils of the trapeze.

Against the background of Clyde Beatty's 3-ring circus a story of murder and suspense is played. When a series of mysterious disasters befall the circus during its tour of the country, Mickey Spillane accepts the challenge of finding the killer. The personable manner of the new ringmaster, and a seemingly perfect alibi leave him in the clear, but not for too long. Spillane reportedly solves the mystery of the "Ring of Fear" in a manner similar to the way Mike Hammer would handle it.

for external affairs and external territories, says the range lies within the Australian Antarctic territory, which covers 2,500,000 square miles.

"The discovery could be one of the most significant yet made in Antarctica," said Mr. Casey. "The mountains are largely free of ice and geologists can work on them more easily than other Antarctic areas."

Robert Dovers, officer in charge of Mawson, Australia's base in the Antarctic, led the party which found the range. His companions were Dr. Robert Summers and Bruce Sinear, a geologist. The party found the range after a 150-mile journey from Mawson with a dog team and a "weasel," a tracked snow-vehicle.

On Dec. 29 they reached the peaks known as "Nunataks." From the peaks they sighted the range. The party estimated that the peaks of the range rose to about 10,000 feet above sea level.

The Australian polar ship Kista Dan has left Melbourne for Mawson. It will pick up the present expedition and land a new expedition for a year's term at the base.
