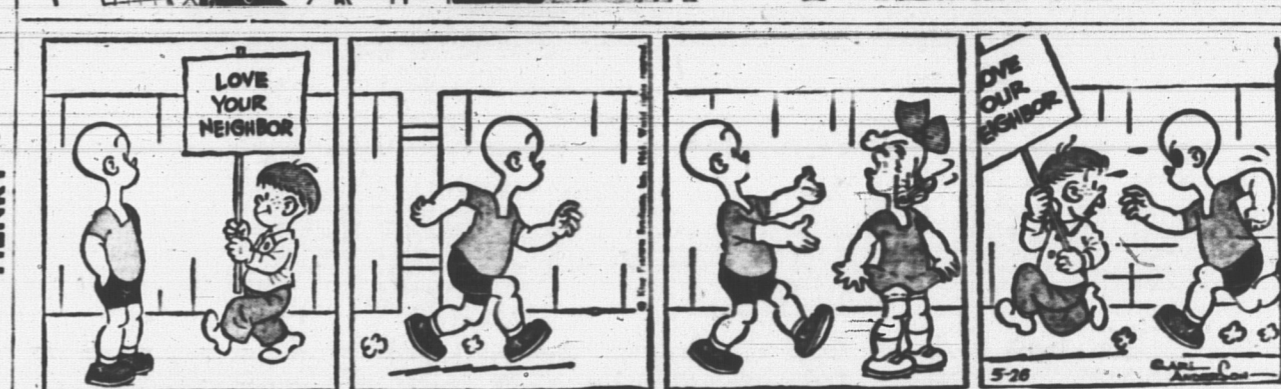

India's Scientists One Step From Nuclear Weapon Field

 NEW DELHI (AP)—India's scientists have moved within one step of entering the nuclear weapons business. But there is no indication they soon will take that last step.
 Well-informed experts say that within 18 months of receiving a "go" signal, India's highly regarded nuclear establishment could explode a crude plutonium device.
 In the context of modern weaponry, however, such a device probably would not qualify as a bomb. Competitive pressure to match nuclear arsenals in the West, Soviet Union or even China is far beyond India's reach.
 Additionally, India has neither rockets nor planes with which to deliver substantial numbers of nuclear weapons—

... especially the cumbersome type it now is capable of producing.
 The main fear among diplomats here is that India, for reasons of international prestige or internal politics, might go ahead with a crude device—thereby setting off a chain reaction of nuclear proliferation in such countries as Pakistan, Japan, Indonesia and the United Arab Republic.
 Prime Minister Shastri insists India will not start such a dangerous arms race. But there is a strong demand for a nuclear bang to match neighboring China's — and Shastri shows it. Shortly after Peking's first nuclear explosion last year, Shastri declared unequivocally that India would not follow suit. Now, he says this decision "stands for the present."
 But now that China, India's

... second nuclear device, pressure on Shastri will increase greatly. Neutral experts are certain India has not yet launched the expensive and complicated job of building a "sophisticated" nuclear weapon.
 This requires, among other things, huge amounts of electricity and the experts can find no signs that India's nuclear establishment at Trombay on the west coast is diverting extra-large portions.
 Also, experts say, making a sophisticated weapon based on uranium-235 demands large amounts of intricate machinery which India does not make and — at present — isn't buying abroad.
 There have been, however, substantial increases in budget outlays for nuclear energy development — \$93,500,000 this year, compared with \$61,200,000 last year.
 IMPROVING TECHNOLOGY
 Some experts feel this indicates India is improving its nuclear technology to a level just below bomb-making capability. "When the politicians say

 Dear Mr. Becker: I don't know whether or not you can help me with my problem, but I have reached a desperate situation where I am willing to grasp at any straw.
 A year ago I was playing in a rubber bridge game and held the South hand. You can imagine my feeling of disappointment when I heard East open the bidding ahead of me. I needed so little to make a small slam or a grand slam — just an ace or two — and this bloke who sits on my right and never psyches in his life suddenly says a diamond.
 Well, I got to four spades, all right, and won the diamond lead with the ace. I led the king of spades. East took it and returned a diamond, which I ruffed and West overruled.
 West then put East in with a heart, and another diamond lead ruined me. I didn't matter whether I trumped his or low — West was bound to get another trump trick and I went down one redoubled.
 That night I couldn't sleep a wink, or the next night, or the next night either. My appetite fell off terribly and I felt plain miserable. This predicament continued for weeks. Finally, I consulted a psychiatrist.
 After the usual treatment — it got so I was spending more time on the psychiatrist's couch than I was in bed at home — he told me the cause of my troubles.
 I tried a few other skull doctors and they all told me the same thing. They said I should not have trumped the diamond return at trick three, but should have discarded my heart. Then when West overruled the next diamond lead he wouldn't be able to put East in the lead again and I would have made the hand.
 So I know what I should have done. But I still can't sleep nights as I relieve this nightmare over and over again.
 What occurs to me is that maybe if I see this hand in print it will all go away like a bad dream. Sincerely yours, John Doe.

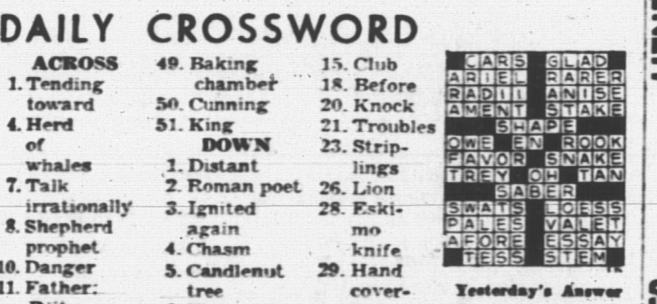
