Montague Town Council Meeting Last Night

A special meeting of the Montague Town Council was held last night with Mayor B. H. Yeo presiding. Present were Councilors MacGowan, Reynolds, Nicholson, Hessian and Greene.

The usual committees were appointed for the street, lights, fire, finance, sanitation and police.

It was moved that a bonus of \$100.00 be paid the Town Clerk, Mr. Arnold Wightman, in consideration of extra services during 1952. It was also moved that Mr. Wightman be appointed as Town Clerk for 1953 at a salary of \$400.00 and a bonus to be decided upon by the Council. The town having no magistrate, it was moved that Stipendiary Magistrate Joseph W. MacDonald, Q.C., for the County of Kings be appointed as magistrate for the town of Montague.

The tax arrears for 1952 were discussed and a decision to collect same was made. It was accordingly moved that all taxes due for the year 1952 and other arrears must be paid by March 15, as the list will then be published according to law as set out in the Town Act.

Considerable discussion ensued regarding a bill of arrears of approximately \$258.00 outstanding to Maritime Electric. This bill arises from non payment of two monthly bills, one in 1947 and another in 1949, the two bills totalling approximately \$148.00. In succeeding years, however, monthly discounts and other items were added until the bill reached its present amount. The clerk informed the Council that the first notification of this bill was given in October of last year, and Mayor Yeo stated that he had received the statement from the company regarding this matter only last week. After discussion the Council gave Councilor Hessian authority to investigate the matter.

Govt. Keeps

Continued from page 1 the government virtually cut the tariff by half on imports of wire ropes or cable used in commercial fishing operations.

Other reductions cover: books for review; tapes for tying vegetables; refrigerator parts; materials used for manufacture and repair of commercial fishing engines; gas control safety valves; gas and gasoline engines for commercial fishing boats; olives sulphured in brine; petroleum waxes; silage caps; plow bolts; apparatus for universities, schools and public hospitals, coyote getters and diesel engine starters.

Aid To Returning Servicemen

Under a new regulation, Canadian servicemen returning from foreign service will be allowed to bring in up to \$1,000 worth of personal or household goods free, if they have been away for a year or more.

The goods must, however, have been owned by them at least six months before their return to Canada and must not be sold for at least a year after returning.

Not included in this duty-free concession are alcoholic beverages, cigars, cigarettes and manufactured tobacco.

1. Parents may claim a deduction of \$400 from taxable income for each dependent child over 21 attending university. The exemption now applies only when the children are under 21.

2. The budget increases to \$760 from \$600 the amount of money which a taxpayer's dependent may earn and still be classed as a dependent for taxation purposes.

Lowering of the medical-expenses "floor", Mr. Abbott estimated, will lose him about \$10,000,000 a year.

He refused demands that the floor be eliminated altogether, holding that normal medical expenses should not be lifted out of the tax field.

The whole list of personal income tax reductions and concessions were estimated as saving the taxpayer about \$185,000,000 a year after the coming year.

Mr. Abbott estimated the new cigarette-tax reduction—which followed a three-cent reduction last year after an earlier increase had kicked back by lowering sales and revenue—will amount to \$15,000,000 a year in the excise tax itself and another \$2,000,000 in sales tax.

The sales tax is imposed on the price of cigarettes after excise tax.

cheques up to \$100 and larger amounts after that that has yielded about \$12,000,000 a year. It has been in effect since shortly after the First World War.

The Minister estimated he will lose \$17,000,000 a year eventually by the provision for giving Quebec corporations the seven-per-cent concession.

Withdrawal of the sales tax from the few items affected will amount to only \$8,000,000 a year. Of this, it was estimated, \$1,000,000 would be on the elimination of the book tax and another \$3,000,000 on the newspaper and magazine materials.

The new credit for dividends from Canadian companies will lose the treasury an estimated \$20,000,000 a year.

Agricultural Short Course At St. George's

A well attended Agricultural Short Course was conducted over a three-day period at St. George's last week, which brought to the district many Government officials and leaders in their respective fields.

Rev. B. D. MacDonald gave an address of welcome at the initial meeting on Thursday, which was presided over by Mr. F. M. Deacon, Fieldman for King's County. Discussion groups were formed which carried on throughout the series, interspersed with addresses by Miss Mary Robin, B.Sc., Home Economics Supervisor, and Mrs. Maylea Manning, Assistant Supervisor. Miss Hazel Roland also addressed the assembly on Home Planning and "Vim and Vigor from the garden."

Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture gave a brief talk during the series on the "Problems of Agriculture" and Mr. S. C. Wright dealt with 4-H Club work, commending the Junior Farmers for their splendid results.

Other speakers heard with great interest were Mr. W. S. McMurtry, Director of Farm Improvement Service on Grass Sillage, and Mr. J. F. Gaudet, Chief Forestry Officer on woodlot management. Mr. David Peacock, B.S.A., spoke on the place of livestock on the farm and Mr. Wilfred Driscoll dealt with Cooperatives and Credit Unions.

The meeting on Saturday was addressed by Dr. George Fletcher, V.S., Provincial Animal Pathologist on diseases of animals and by Mr. A. G. LeLacheur, Plants Products Division on the selection of good seeds.
