The London Election Case

A JUDGMENT has been rendered by the County Judge which practically puts an end to the contention over the London election case. The judge held that the persons whose names on the voters' list were distinguished by the letter "A," were entitled to vote. These voters being counted, the Hon. Mr. Carling has a clear majority of 109 votes. Of course the oppositionists contend that the judge's decision is "scandalous," and that "outrage" has been committed.

Civic Reforms.

The report of the meeting of the City Council, held last evening, shows that several interesting and important notices of motions have been given. Another attempt is to be made to meet the equitable claim of the W. C. T. U., to be reimbursed the amount expended by them in the prosecution of the Scott Act, and several changes are contemplated, chief of which is Councilor McKay's proposal to abolish the Board of Water Commissioners. Councilor McKay argues that the duties of the Commissioners can just as well be performed by a Committee of the City Council, and that upwards of \$2,000 in cash can be saved if the Board be abolished. We must give Councilor McKay the credit of having adopted a policy of economy and reform which is worthy of consideration. Certainly it is necessary, now-a-days, to save the people's money in every direction in which a saving can be effected without impairment of service. The question is, will the water service be impaired if Councilor McKay's proposition is accepted? Many persons would feel more assured on this point if the Councilors were each and all elected as the Commissioners are elected—by the rate payers of the whole city. In that case the proposition would probably be accepted without any considerable opposition. As it is, it will probably be received with general favor unless it can be shown that the retention of the Board is necessary to the maintenance of the water service unimpaired.

The tournament will be held on the Charlottetown Driving Park, on Thursday, 20th June, and Friday, 1st July. On the forenoon of the first day there will be a parade of the local and visiting firemen with apparatus, and in the afternoon there will be a public dinner in the Exhibition building and firemen's sports. At night there will be a torchlight procession and display of fireworks. On the second day the firemen's sports will be concluded, and the proceedings will be brought to a close with a promenade concert in the Exhibition building, at which prizes will be awarded for the best band music. Bands from Moncton, Halifax, Fredericton, Amherst, St. John, and other places will compete. The committee are working hard to make the tournament a grand success, and are meeting with much encouragement at the hands of citizens generally. Already letters have been received from the five departments of Halifax, Moncton, Amherst and St. John accepting the invitations extended to them to be present at the tournament. Two hundred men are expected from Halifax and an equal number from St. John. Moncton and Amherst will also send large contingents. A hockey match in aid of the tournament fund will be played in the Hillsborough Rink to-morrow (Wednesday) evening, between a Salvage Corps team and a team of All-comers. Galbraith's band will be in attendance. Let everyone show that they appreciate our firemen and are in favor of a tournament by attending in large numbers.

Civic Eulers in Council.

THE BUSINESS TRANSACTED AT LAST NIGHT'S MEETING.

THE regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening. There were present: His Worship, Mayor Haviland, His Honor Recorder Fitzgerald, Chief Engineer Lyver, and Councilors Crabbe, Hogan, McKay, Beer, Hughes, Robertson, Taylor and Hooper.

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved, and a number of bills were disposed of.

Coun. Crabbe moved that the Finance Committee be authorized to make the necessary arrangements with the Merchants Bank of Prince Edward Island or other bank for such overdraft as is now in existence and as may hereafter be required for the redemption of debentures falling due this year, and also for all other expenses of the city. Coun. Hogan seconded the motion. Carried.

The estimates of the City School Board for the year ending 31st December, 1892, were submitted. The total amount is \$10,313—\$7,143 for current expenditure and \$3,170 for interest on debentures. The Board was voted \$1000 to meet present requirements.

A letter was read from Michael Egan, contractor for the re-building of Queen's Wharf, offering to widen that portion of the wharf directly opposite the building known as the Fish Market, and to remove the old building on the end of the wharf and place the same on that part of the wharf proposed to be widened; the size of the extension to the wharf to be 25 feet in width and 100 feet in length, to be built of hemlock timber, and of the same manner of construction as the work now under contract, the city to fill up the enclosure with clay or other material. Egan's letter was accompanied by one from Charles McGregor, inspector of the re-building of the wharf, stating that Egan offered to make the extension to the wharf and do the other work referred to in his letter for the sum of \$500 in addition to the amount of his present contract. The offer was referred to the Public Property Committee to report on.

On motion, Mr. Egan was voted \$1000 on account of contract for the re-building of Queen's Wharf, and a payment being in accordance with the terms of his agreement.

His Worship submitted the following report of a committee of the last council:— The committee appointed to confer with the Executors of the Connolly Estate with the view of having Dorchester Street extended to Haviland Street beg to report:—

That the Executors of the Connolly Estate are willing to give to the city as much land between Union and Haviland Streets as will enable the city to make the proposed extension of Dorchester Street if the city will transfer to the Executors that piece or parcel of land at the western end of Sydney Street, owned by the city and known as the old engine house property.

Your committee recommend that the offer of the Executors be accepted and that the Mayor be authorized and empowered by the Council to transfer by deed or otherwise the said engine house property on Sydney Street to the Executors.

Councilor Hogan moved that the report be adopted. Seconded by Councilor Taylor. Carried.

Councilor Beer moved in amendment that the report be referred to the Public Property Committee to report upon, at the next meeting of the Council.

The amendment was carried.

A petition from certain married members of the police force complaining that the salaries they at present received were insufficient to maintain the positions and their wives and families and asking for an increase in the amount paid them, was referred to the Finance Committee, to report upon at next meeting.

A memorial from Mr. H. V. Palmer, Clerk of the City Police Court, complaining that the salary paid him is inadequate and not in proportion to the amount of work performed and asking for an increase, was also referred to the Finance Committee to report upon.

A letter was read from Mr. John T. Mellish, attorney at law, stating that he was instructed by Mr. Daniel Weatherly to inform the Board that if no arrangement can be made by way of indemnifying him (Weatherly) in respect to the very serious injuries sustained by him by reason of a defective sidewalk at or near the corner of Panton and Pleasant Streets, he would hold the necessary of taking legal proceedings against the city. Referred to a special committee of three, composed of Councilors Crabbe, Hogan and McKay.

A letter from Mr. W. S. Stewart, attorney, etc., conveyed the information that he had been retained by L. W. Harris to commence an action against the city to recover damages for injuries sustained by a horse on the 6th December last through the negligence of the city. Mr. Harris places his claim at \$65. Referred to the same special committee.

The applicant of James B. Pollard for the position of City Sanitary Officer, was laid on the table.

A letter was read from Mr. F. W. L. Moore, brewer, etc., in reference to a nuisance existing on Elward Street, and particularly in and about the premises of Patrick Kelly, which nuisance he claimed was caused by the neglect of the city to provide proper drainage. Mr. Moore complains that the surface water lodges on Kelly's premises after every rain, flooding his cellar and at times making it difficult for him to get from his house to his barn, and states that unless the Board takes measures to abate the nuisance Mr. Kelly will take action against the city for such damage as he has sustained. Referred to the Street Committee to take such action as they deem advisable.

Moved by Coun. McKay, seconded by Coun. Robertson:—

Whereas, By the "Charlottetown Waterworks Act, 1887," Water Commissioners for the City of Charlottetown were incorporated under the name and style of "The Water Commissioners for the City of Charlottetown," and as such corporation had certain duties to perform and certain powers conferred upon them as set forth in the said Act and by Acts in amendment thereof; and

Whereas, The Waterworks for the said City of Charlottetown are now constructed and there is no further need of said Water Commissioners; and

Whereas, The office of the said Water Commissioners is maintained at considerable expense to the City of Charlottetown, a number of employes being engaged in or in connection with that office; and

Whereas, The duties now discharged by the said Water Commissioners and their employes might be well discharged by the City Clerk and such assistants as he may from time to time require in his office; and

Whereas, By amalgamating the offices much unnecessary expense to the city might be saved; and

Whereas, It is advisable that the Mayor for the City should be Chairman of the Water Commissioners as well as that the business of the Waterworks should be carried on by the Mayor and a committee; and

Whereas, It may be and is necessary in order to make the changes and to effect the economies hereinbefore mentioned that legislation for that purpose be obtained; and

Whereas, The Legislature of this Province is called to meet for the despatch of business on the 22d inst., and it is desirable that the said bill should be laid before it as early a date as possible and it is necessary in order that the said amendments should be discussed by this Council at a special meeting called for that purpose at an earlier date than the next regular monthly meeting;

Therefore Resolved, That a committee be appointed to draw up such amendments to the said "Waterworks Act" and to "The Charlottetown Incorporation Act," as may be necessary to effect the changes and reforms hereinbefore referred to;

Further Resolved, That a bill embodying the changes and reforms hereinbefore referred to be submitted by this Council to the Legislature at its forthcoming session.

Further Resolved, That a special meeting of this Council be called for the 21st day of March, instant, to consider the matters hereinbefore referred to and take such measures as may be necessary to give them effect.

After some discussion this resolution was put and carried on division, Councilors Crabbe and Beer being the only members of the Board voting against it.

Councilors McKay, Hogan and Robertson were appointed a committee to draft the bill for submission to the Legislature referred to in the resolution.

Councilor Crabbe moved that the City Clerk be instructed to call for tenders for 50,000 feet of hemlock plank. Seconded by Councilor Hogan. Carried.

Councilor Crabbe gave notice that at the next regular meeting of the Board he would introduce a by-law to license, regulate and in some cases to prevent billiard tables, bowling alleys and other places of amusement in the city.

Councilor Crabbe also gave notice that at the next regular meeting he would move that the amount asked for by the W. C. T. U. in their memorial to the Board be paid.

Councilor Crabbe moved that the Board of Fire Engineers consist of three members instead of fifteen as at present, said Engineers to be styled Chief Engineer and first and second assistants. Seconded by Councilor Hooper. Carried on the following division and the casting vote of the Mayor:—

Ayes—Crabbe, Hooper, Hughes, Beer, Nays—Hogan, Robertson, Taylor, McKay.

Councilor Crabbe moved that A. N. Lyver, F. H. Beer and Charles Harman constitute the Board of Fire Engineers for the current term. Seconded by Councilor Hughes.

Councilor Taylor moved in amendment that the name of F. H. Beer be struck out of said resolution and the name of John McPhail be inserted in its stead. Seconded by Councilor Robertson.

The amendment was put and lost on the casting vote of the Mayor and the following division:—

Ayes—Taylor, Robertson, Hogan, McKay. Nays—Crabbe, Hughes, Beer, Hooper.

The main resolution was then put and carried.

Councilor Beer moved that a fire committee of the Council be appointed, said committee to consist of Councilors Crabbe, Hughes and Hooper. Seconded by Councilor Hughes.

Councilor Hogan moved in amendment that the Fire Committee be composed of Councilors Taylor, Robertson and McKay. Councilor McKay seconded the motion.

The amendment was put and lost on the following division and the casting vote of the Mayor:—

Ayes—Hogan, McKay, Robertson, Taylor. Nays—Crabbe, Beer, Hughes, Hooper.

The main motion was then put and carried. Councilor Hogan then explained certain repairs and alterations proposed to be made to the Market building. The proposed changes will cost about \$2,500. It was decided to call for tenders for the work, and to write the Minister of Public Works, Ottawa, in reference to allowing a drain from the Market House to empty into the Government sewer on Great George Street.

The application of Edward Flynn for the leasing of the King Street Engine House, was referred to the Public Property Committee. Meeting adjourned sine die.
