## Lobster Carnival Breaks All Attendance Records

**SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**—This year's version of the seventh annual Summerside Lobster Carnival was a smashing success as measured by the increase of visitors and exhibitors.

Carnival Manager Charles Hogan last night said attendance figures for this year were approximately 21,000 which is 7,000 more than the 14,000 of last Saturday, the carnival's final day.

An estimated 500 persons bought supper tickets, with attendance for the day set at 31,228.

Mr. Hogan called the carnival "the best we've ever had." President Arthur Johnstone termed it "an outstanding success." Both officials stated that several improvements and additions this year contributed towards the success of the carnival and Mr. Johnstone.

Mr. Johnstone noted that interest was high in all phases of the program, including the track and field meet, when several records were smashed; the RCMP band performances; the feature acts on stage each day; the "Miss P.E.I." contest; and the coronation ball at the Canadian Legion Home, Saturday night.

This year, for the first time, a section of the livestock exhibition was devoted to sheep and horse exhibits. Judges were particularly impressed with the exceptional quality of all animals entered this year. Large crowds gathered to view the showing and judging of all classes in the livestock exhibits.

The farmers were well pleased with the new livestock barn built for this year's livestock exhibition.

Great interest was displayed in the fisheries exhibits inside the stadium, where an attractive display of large and small island tropical fish was one of the principal drawing cards.

A number of out-of-the-province visitors accorded warm compliments on many aspects of the week's program.

With the success of this year's carnival, bigger and more extensive plans are already being laid for next year's event.

## Payer Captures USPGA Ch'ship

Goaly, from Belleville, Ill., finished with a three-under-par 67 for second place at 279.

Thus, only Payer and Goaly were under par for the four arduous rounds over the 7,045 yard, par 70 Aronimink Golf Club course.

Jack Nicklaus bounced out of a slump which has haunted him since his U.S. Open victory last month and closed with a brilliant 67 which tied him with George Bayer for third money at \$21.
