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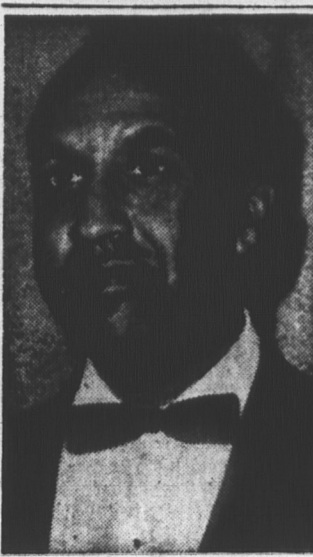
### Former Principal Passes In Hospital

A former principal of the West Kent School in Charlottetown for many years C.F. Hine died Thursday night at the Prince Edward Island Hospital in his 65th year, following a stroke which he suffered over last weekend.

Mr. Hine was the son of M. and Mrs. Charles Hine and was born in Charlottetown. He was educated at Prince of Wales College in Charlottetown and at Kings College in Windsor, N.S.

He began his teaching career at West Kent School and except for a five year period during World War II when he served as principal of Prince Street School, he remained at WKS. Mr. Hine assumed the duties of principal of the school at the time of the death of Herbert Yeo.

Mr. Hine was intensely interested in army cadet work in the schools and worked to further this portion of youth training.

Successful candidates in the Civil Service Commission completion recently held in the Province were Nelson Hurry, 201 Weymouth Street, Charlottetown, Frank St. John, 729 Slemom Park, Summerside and Walter Stewart formerly of Sea View, P.E.I. and now attending the Maritime Forest Ranger School in Fredericton, N.B.

Nelson Hurry is well known to Island sportsmen having been associated for a number of years with the P.E.I. Fish and Game Association in several capacities, more recently as president of the provincial body of the Association. Mr. Hurry's interests in wildlife go back to his early school days at which time he displayed a keen interest in nature study and undertook taxidermy as a hobby.

He is a director of the Canadian Wildlife Federation Inc., a National Organization dedicated to wildlife conservation, and the P.E.I. Natural History Society, a local body also dedicated to the conservation of natural resources.

As Conservation Officer for Queens County, Nelson and his wife Sandra, and son, Trent, will be residing in Charlottetown.

Frank St. John brings to the Fish and Game Division several years of experience in police work, having served for a number of years as a senior N.C.O. with the Security Police, with the R.C.A.F. upon taking up his new duties as conservation officer for Prince County. KENSINGTON — The 35th annual provincial convention of the Prince Edward Island-Comand Royal Canadian Legion opened last evening at Kensington with the Kensington branch hosting the two-day convention in the Kensington Legion Home.

Lieutenant Governor W.J. MacDonald officially opened the convention after registration of delegates from across the province and a parade under parade marshal James Evans, assembling at the Legion and moving to Kensington Regional High School.

The theme of this year's convention is "Bring Your Wife and Enjoy Life", and many delegates did bring their wives along to enjoy the program which has been designed with intent to please the ladies. This afternoon the ladies will be taken on tours of the Woodleigh Replicas and Cabot Park, followed by tea in Kensington.

Provincial president Pius Smith presided over the opening ceremonies and officially welcomed the delegates to the convention. Mayor Everett Champion gave the delegates the civic welcome to the town. Clair Mayhew gave the host-branch president's address of welcome, followed by the Lieutenant-Governor's official declaration of the convention open and the introduction of guests by comrade Smith and remarks from Ron MacBeath, Moncton, N.B., Dominion president, and other guests.

A dance and get-acquainted session at the Kensington Legion Home brought the evening to a close.

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## Mayor MacLean Chairs Meeting

GEORGETOWN — Mayor Howard S. MacLean presided over a recent meeting of the Georgetown Town Council. The meeting was attended by councillors J. W. Lavers, Mrs. Joan Currie, James G. McGonnell and Joseph E. Johnston.

Progress payments on the town's sewage system, presently being established were moved and amounted to \$5,819. This makes the total progress payments made to date \$39,000.

The council decided to approve the removal of 300 cubic yards of clay from what is locally known as the "Old-Jail Hill". A survey of this area was done by Laurie A. Coles and Associates and a grade plan was submitted to the council.

This amount of fill which will be used on the Centennial Park project can be moved from the present location without affecting the area for building lot purposes and will leave a finished grade of one foot above the surrounding street level. This area would be covered with a top soil at a later date.

Another matter discussed and approved was the opening of a drain through the closed section of Gordon Street and Fitzroy Street or commonly known as what was formerly part of the old exhibition grounds. This drain would then be continued for a distance north on Fitzroy Street and south on Fitzroy Street to the Canadian National railway crossing.

**BANK THE SHOULDER**  
The clay used in the dredging of the east side of Fitzroy Street would be used to bank the shoulder of the pavement.

The council also discussed the by-law relating to the licence fees payable by the Insurance Companies doing business in the town. Some changes are anticipated in the by-law before the next fiscal year commences.

The amount of \$2,758 representing the balance owing the King's County Construction Company for work done on the Centennial Park project was ordered paid. This was accomplished by using the amount of \$758.38 received from the Centennial Committee and \$2,000 from the Department of Municipal Affairs for Beautification.

At an earlier date the sum of \$744 received from the Centennial Committee had been paid to the construction company.

The question of the sale of a kitchen range owned by the town and presently located in a house which the town had under lease up to July was discussed and the town clerk was instructed to contact the party owning the house and advise her that she had been granted the priority on the purchase of the range.

**URGES FARM LOAN**  
He also urged the government to provide \$60,000 in low cost loans for approximately 1,000 farmers who would farm over 200 acres of land annually. He said "this province is not utilizing its land to the best results particularly with regard to the food demands of the future. Agricultural trends are such that larger farms and more mechanized farms must be the pattern. The essential capital should be available without regard to political advantage. To those desirous of exerting more than routine efforts and it must be made available at non-usurious rates." To complement such a program, he said, a technical advisory group should exist.

There are, he added, for example, major markets for meat right in the other Maritime provinces. A program of this nature would put many so called worn-out farms back into production.

many in the tourist industry have suffered extensively from the recent railway strike in which the ferries, not owned by the railway, were involved. The mishandling of that event resulted in a reduction of the tourist season about 20 per cent. It is hoped that regardless of the so-called "rightmoneys" policy, the government of Canada and the banks and other money-lending sources will have due regard for the problems imposed and recognize that they were beyond the control of the resort operator.

Mr. Margison also urged that organizations within the province start work on having Air Canada establish a direct service between this province and Montreal.

At yesterday afternoon's session the subject of "Developing Prince Edward Island" was carried further in a panel discussion and question period in which various aspects of industrial development were discussed.

Participating in the panel discussion, which was chaired by W.A. Smith, manager of Maritime Electric, were Mr. Margison, T.J. Flood, newly-appointed manager of Industrial Enterprises Corp. George Cheverle, manager of the National Employment Service here and J.J. Revell, chairman of the P.E.I. Labor Relations Board.

The panel discussed various aspects of developing including manpower training and the providing of skilled workers, labor-management relations, the general development picture as it exists in P.E.I., transportation problems and so on. Following the panelists' remarks, questions from the floor were discussed.

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
