

Domestic Product Has 2nd Quarter Increase

OTTAWA (CP)—The bureau of statistics seasonally-adjusted index of non-agricultural real domestic product stood at 207.9 for the second quarter of this year, compared with 205.4 for the first quarter and 200.9 for the last quarter of last year. The index is based on 1949 output equalling 100.

The recently-developed index of real domestic product is intended to be a more accurate reflection of the true performance of the Canadian industrial economy than the broader, all-inclusive gross national product.

The gross national product figures announced last week for the second quarter of 1965 was an annual rate of \$50,940,000,000, an 8.4 per cent increase over \$47,000,000,000, the actual total value of all end-product goods and services produced in Canada in 1964.

The most marked gains were made in durable goods manufacturing, up 48.3 per cent, and in electric power and gas utilities, up 42.6 per cent. Other major output advances were in forestry, up 38.3 per cent, and in wholesale trade, up 37.9 per cent.

The only industry to show a negative change is fishing and trapping, down 13.4 per cent, though it had been down only 3.5 per cent in the last quarter of last year.

CLC Rejects Bid By SIU For Return

OTTAWA (CP)—The executive council of the Canadian Labor Congress has made it official that the Seafarers' International Union of Canada will not be reinstated in the CLC unless a full-fledged convention of the congress supports the move.

Claude Jodoin, president of the 1,500,000-member labor body, issued a statement to that effect after the CLC's 20-man executive council spent almost a full day discussing the SIU's application for readmission.

The SIU was booted out of the congress in 1963 by executive council action after it was found guilty of raiding the membership of another CLC affiliate, the National Association of Marine Engineers.

Later the CLC set up an opposition union, the Canadian Maritime Union, and supported it in an organizational campaign against the SIU.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

You are the dealer, both sides vulnerable. What would you bid with each of the following five hands.

- ♠AKQ10 ♣K7 ♣AQ ♣AQ ♣AQ ♣AJ ♣97643 ♠AKQ10 ♣AJ2
- ♠AK83 ♣AKQ2 ♣5 ♣9853
- ♠AK753 ♣AJ8642 ♣Q6 ♣AQ852 ♣AJ ♣J883 ♣AQ8
- Three notrump. This bid indicates a balanced hand, with 25 to 27 high-card points in a diamond strength or stoppers in all suits—which is exactly what you have.
- It would be wrong to open with two spades. While this bid would represent great strength and be forcing to game, it would not reflect the balanced distribution and extraordinary high-card values. Most forcing two-bids have attractive distributional values but only about 20 points in high cards. They are based more on trick-take values.
- A two-spade opening might also result in the weak hand becoming declarer at notrump instead of the strong hand.
- One heart. This is the proper bid, even though the suit is headed by only the nine-spot. It must be remembered that if partner has any three hearts the suit is playable as trumps, and that unless the hearts are bid now, the proper trump suit may never be found. Of course, you're not expected to relish bidding such a horrible suit, but you have to try to do the best you can with what you're dealt.
- One spade. The opening bid with hands patterned 4-4-1 is usually made in the suit beneath the singleton, but here the clubs are ignored because they are virtually non-existent. It is best to plan to bid the two suits you really have, and naturally, you bid the higher-ranking one first.
- One diamond. The main effort here is devoted to identifying the 6-5 distribution. The best way of doing this is by opening with a diamond and bidding hearts next.
- Partner will no doubt assume that we have four hearts and five diamonds, but this impression can be corrected at the next round when we rebid the hearts (assuming that partner has not raised them). Partner will then know that we have five hearts and, since we opened the bidding with a diamond, that we have longer diamonds, probably six of them.
- One club. It is not desirable to open with a three-card suit, but when there is a choice of evils and bidding the three-card suit is the least evil, you just bid it. You can't pass with 14 points, or open with a notrump, and you shouldn't bid a spade or a diamond with these weak suits, so you choose a club at the bid least likely to do your side harm.

Island Company Given Contract

Noye and Noye, a P.E.I. firm, has been awarded a \$35,400 contract for further construction as a protection for the slip-way for boats of the Federal Department of Fisheries at Ellerslie P.E.I., it was announced in Ottawa Wednesday.

The construction will consist of the building of a 404 feet long sea wall. The first or outer 48 feet will be built with steel H piles, and reinforced concrete panels will be placed between the piles. The next 38 feet of the wall will comprise a slip built with creosoted tiles, topped with concrete caps. There will be a concrete deck 24 feet wide. The remaining length will be a concrete retaining wall which will be back filled with suitable material.
