Montague Planning To Observe Coronation Day

A special meeting of the Montague Town Council was held last night with Mayor Yeo presiding in the interest of preparing a program for the civic observance of the coronation on June 2nd. Besides the council, a representative group of citizens was also present.

Judge J. S. DesRoches presented a report of a meeting of the Coronation Committee which he attended in Charlottetown and from his report the meeting was able to acquire many ideas which would serve to help organize the local celebration.

A central committee was formed comprising general chairman, Judge J. S. DesRoches, Canadian Legion, Commodore J. G. O'Connell, Ethan Stewart, Masons, R. K. Clements, Women's Institute, Mrs. Lorne Wigginton, Home and School, Ralph Beck, Rebekahs, Ruth MacLeod, School Trustees, S. S. Hession, Montague School, Jack Hughes, Scout, Eric Sutar, Town Council, Doug MacGowan.

As a tentative program, the following was proposed: Free afternoon matinee show for the children starting at 1:30-3:30, parade of school children, adult organizations, police and firemen, Oddfellows, Elks, and firemen, etc. His Worship, Mayor Yeo, and others, 4:00 reproduction of the Queen's message, closing with a short entertaining program. In the evening a gala display of fireworks, in conjunction with Charlottetown, a jet air flight may be brought to fly over the town during the celebration.

In the morning all school children will be given flags and medallions to remember the occasion, and to wear during the parade. It is also planned to decorate the main street of the town with flags, and business houses and private home owners are requested to decorate their

"FISH AND GAME CONVICTIONS — Yesterday afternoon at Souris before Superintendent Magistrate Joseph W. MacDonald, pleas of guilty were entered by counsel on behalf of two residents of Dingwell's Mills charged under the Special Fishery Regulations with fishing for speckled trout in close season. Fines and costs totalling \$48.40 were committed at Dingwell's Mills. On pleas of guilty two residents of Charlottetown were sentenced to fines of \$5.00 and costs (\$3.00) each for angling for trout without license. Offences were committed at Midgell and Fortune. Also a resident of St. Peter's Lake was fined \$25.00 and costs (\$5.25) or 30 days under the Migratory Bird Regulations for hunting widgee in close season. The latter case completes the roll call of the five hunters who surrounded Hennebry's stubble field, Morell Bear before dawn on the morning of November 29, 1952. The cases were investigated and prosecuted by the Provincial Police Constable.

Report Lobster Fishermen Away To Good Start

Lobster fishermen out of Georgetown and adjacent areas ran all their rope yesterday to start the 1953 lobster fishing season. Though the day was clear, a cold north, north-west wind tended to make conditions anything but pleasant, but reports from various fishing grounds are that all rope was run. Trapping of the lines will commence in earnest today. A few loads of traps were placed on the inside lines yesterday. There is no scarcity of bait. One hundred or more boats fish out of Georgetown and adjacent bays.

A government patrol boat early yesterday morning discovered a considerable quantity of rope which was evidently run the previous day. Some of this rope was confiscated, and the balance, was disposed of for the time being by having the buoy lines cut off. The canning plants in Georgetown of Redmond Export Ltd. and William S. Martell, and that of James Hewitt and Son Lower Montague, will commence canning operations on Saturday.

Had Narrow Escape

One Georgetown fisherman, Mr. Albert King, had a narrow escape from drowning when he fell overboard off Boughton Island, but quick work on the part of Mr. Clarence David, who was assisting Mr. King in the day's operations, saved Mr. King's life, and he suffered no ill effects.

From the south shore to East Point practically all lines were run without any difficulty. On the north shore, however, fishermen experienced some difficulty in the face of a strong wind. Approximately two-thirds of the line running was completed, with only a few setting out traps following the running. Along the east coast a considerable number of traps were set out, as the fishermen worked in the lee of the wind.

Approximately seventy boats moved out of the Miram Harbour area, twenty-two from Fortune, North Lake, and others from Annandale, Launching and other points. The bait situation was described as very good, and it is expected that the quantity will increase even more as the season advances.

Also during the year, the usual Legion parades were held, the most important being Remembrance Day which was the biggest turnout of veterans since the end of the war, and it was indeed an honour to lead it, and I hope in future all parades will be one hundred per cent turnout.

Following is the text of the report submitted by President C. M. Sinclair: As President of the No. 1 branch Charlottetown Canadian Legion B. E. S. L. I submit herewith an account of our stewardship for year 1952-3.

"Before commencing that part of the report, the Canadian Legion received a great shock last year in the passing away of our Honorary Patron, the late King George VI, who was loved by all of us.

"At this time also may I express my deep sympathy for the families and relations of those members and veterans, who have passed away during the year, and to those who are presently in hospital, may you all be granted a speedy recovery.

"In a branch of the Legion there are great many activities especially so in our branch. It is possible therefore in this report to mention but briefly some of the highlights of the branch during the past year.

"After assuming office as president, my first duty was on behalf of the branch to award a life membership badge to our Honorary President, Charlie Hine, one of the few remaining South African War Veterans as a token of valuable membership to the Canadian Legion.

"In May last year, I had the honour along with other delegates from this branch to attend the Dominion Convention in Montreal. I must express that the convention was a great success and I was deeply impressed by the way the Canadian Legion as a whole is working for the Veteran.

"During the year, extensive repairs were made to the interior and exterior of the home. Our banquet and dance hall is splendidly furnished, our modern kitchen and lounge are something to be proud of. The operation cost was approximately \$5,000 and this has been paid in full. Congratulations must at this time be extended on behalf of the branch to our very capable house chairman, Frank Rush, for the time he spent in the realization of this project. In September last year, our branch was host to the Provincial convention. The guest speaker was our own Dominion President, C. H. Lumsden whose address was really inspiring to all those who were able to hear him.

"During the year a great deal of work was done by various committees, to mention a few, our relief programme was a great deal heavier than in former years; our happy campaign had an increase in sales, although our wreaths and poppies were more expensive than before. man. Arrangements for the 40th annual convention were discussed and it was learned that Mrs. Hugh Summers, Unionville, Ontario, president of the F.W.I.C. will be one of the guest speakers. The report of the Prince Edward Island Women's Institute for A.C. W.W. was discussed and plans for the tour were made. Photos of the delegates who will attend the A.C. W.W. Conference were taken during the meeting. It was moved and seconded that small souvenir place mats be made as gifts for A.C.W.W. delegates visiting this province from other countries. Additional tickets for the coming Audubon Screen Tour were distributed to be sold.



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
