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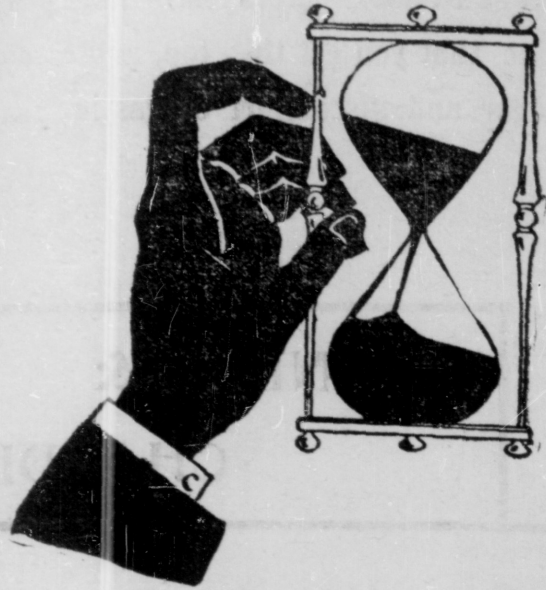

\$1,000,000 in Payments of Railway Subsidies!

(SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.)

OTTAWA, Nov. 12.—The revenue for October shows an increase of \$230,000 and the expenditure an increase of \$230,000. The net debt during the month was increased by \$293,024; and the capital expenditure was increased by \$1,096,424 in the month.

This latter increase was principally in railway subsidies for which last month \$1,151,035 was paid out as against but \$64,000 in October last year.

Certainly the payment of such a large sum on the eve of a general election wears a most suspicious look. It is quite easy to guess how a portion of the Grit campaign fund was obtained.

Southampton Confers Freedom of City.

SOUTHAMPTON, Nov. 12.—This city was in gala attire yesterday and Saturday, and thousands of visitors from London and elsewhere participated in the ceremony of conferring the freedom of the city upon General Buller. General Buller's carriage was deluged with flowers.

When replying to the address of welcome the General expressed great emotion and answered his critics vigorously.

He declared that when the history of the war was fairly written it would be found that the British army in South Africa had confronted tasks far greater than any army operating against any European adversary had ever previously experienced.

LORD MAYOR'S BANQUET.

Memorable Speech by Lord Rosebery Salisbury's Gloomy Views.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—What is probably the most brilliant of all public functions in England, the Lord Mayor's banquet, took place last evening. It will be a memorable event to remember by reason of the remarkable utterances of Lord Rosebery, who, in the presence of five hundred guests, including United States Ambassador Choate, the members of the British cabinet and many of the leading men of England, spoke as follows of the American elections:—

"We believe that the cause which has won is the cause of civilization and commercial honor. We believe these principles to be at the root of all prosperity and all progress in the world. Therefore we claim that we have as much right to rejoice in what has taken place as the distinguished gentleman (referring to Mr. Choate) who sits at my side."

This was greeted by loud and prolonged cheering, which made the gold plate on the oaken shelves shiver and the great rafters of the Guild Hall ring and ring again.

Lord Salisbury's incursion into the internal politics of the United States was preceded by an apology, in the course of which he said: "One of the circumstances which has gratified me most during the last year is the very hearty friendly feeling displayed between this country and the United States. I hope Mr. Choate will forgive me if there is any irregularity in my expression. It is quite wrong for a secretary of state to make any observations with respect to the international politics of another country, but I am soon to give up my office, and in view of this abandonment, which is close at hand, I hope Mr. Choate will forgive me for expressing the supreme satisfaction with which all of us have heard of what has recently taken place in the United States."

Except in its reference to the United States the speech of the premier cast an extraordinary gloom over the gorgeous banquet. Following directly after the colonel commanding the City Imperial Volunteers, Lord Salisbury startled his hearers, who caught the drift of his remarks, by satirizing the war fever, although praising the courage of the soldiers, and declaring that the passionate admiration of military valor evinced by the populace must produce a change of attitude on the part of the outside world when viewing English character. Then, with lowering voice and almost trembling accent he went on to speak of the price of victory and the ravages of death, dealing especially with the Queen's bereavement in the loss of Prince Christian Victor. Finally with bent head and hands clasped, he uttered a hope, almost a prayer, that Lord Roberts might be spared the sorrow now hanging over him by reason of the critical condition of his daughter.

Mr. Choate, replying a few minutes later to the text of the diplomatic corps, declared that Lord Salisbury had stated with much truth, simply and so earnest the result of the elections that he (Mr. Choate) would not add to it, although he would venture to congratulate the noble lord upon the fact that his remarks had been made after instead of before the election. (Laughter.)

The bride wore a very pretty suit of fawn, with purple velvet hat; the bridesmaid was dressed in gray with hat to match. Both Mr. and Mrs. Moore are very popular with their many friends, who join in wishing them every happiness in their journey through life.

In St. John's East, three Liberals were also successful with pluralities aggregating 5732 as against 718 at the former elections.
