**CHARLES DAVID MCKILLOP**  
 "Father, to Thee we look in all our sorrow,

 The community of Murray Harbour North was shocked and saddened when they learned of the tragic and untimely death of Charles David McKillop on the Magdalen Islands, May 20th, 1956.  
 Born on September 9, 1923, he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Charles Henry McKillop, of Winnipeg. At the age of eighteen years he answered his country's call and bravely served for four years in the R.C.N.V.R. during World War II. At the end of the war he made his home in Murray Harbour North.  
 He married Lena Vivian Llewellyn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Llewellyn of this community. Go blessed this union with two sons, Kenneth aged 6 yrs. and Gregory 2 yrs. After spending several years in Nova Scotia he returned to Prince Edward Island and was employed by the firm of Douglas Bros. and Jones, Charlottetown, where he proved himself to be a trusted and conscientious worker. On returning to the Island the family made their home with the McKillops' parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Llewellyn. Charlie, as he was familiarly known, was greatly loved and respected in this home.  
 He was a young man of ability and his pleasing personality and thoughtfulness for others made for him many true friends wherever he was known.  
 His sudden death on the Magdalen Islands came as a terrible shock to his loved ones and friends. Death is sad at all times but particularly so when a young husband and father has been taken at the age of 31 years.

# Moroccan Politics Boil Towards Early Climax

**RABAT, Morocco (AP)**—Moroccan politics boiled toward a climax Sunday as deposed Nationalist Sultan Ben Youssef ended his Madagascar exile and his successor renounced the throne. The quickening developments all suggested greater strength for Youssef, who was kicked off the throne two years ago but now is flying to France with more backing than ever.  
 The man named to replace 41-year-old Youssef, Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafat, Saturday renounced his rights to the throne in favor of the former sultan, who has become a flaming Nationalist symbol. This added new force to the movement to restore Youssef to the throne. The "Tham el Glaoui" movement was launched when Thami el Glaoui, powerful Pasha of Marrakesh, changed sides and rallied to Youssef.

his protocol chief, Abderrahman el Hajoui, who said a letter embodying the decision was handed French Resident-General Pierre Boyer de Latour for relay to President Rene Coty of France. Hajoui said the letter clearly states that Arafat renounces his rights in favor of Youssef. Arafat now is in Tangiers, where he took up residence Oct. 1 after turning his powers over to a four-man regency council.  
 The French agreed to return Youssef to France as a concession in their negotiations with Moroccan Nationalists. The French had strongly opposed his return to the throne, but in the last month Youssef's Moroccan opponents have one by one performed startling about faces and the French now are left as his sole opposition.  
 A member of the throne council — which was supposedly weighted in favor of French views — came out Sunday with a statement that the mission of the council is simply to reinstall Youssef. The statement was made by Mohamed Ben Jah Tabli Sbihi, a Pasha appointed by the French.  
 It was the first open statement by a member of the council urging Youssef's immediate return.

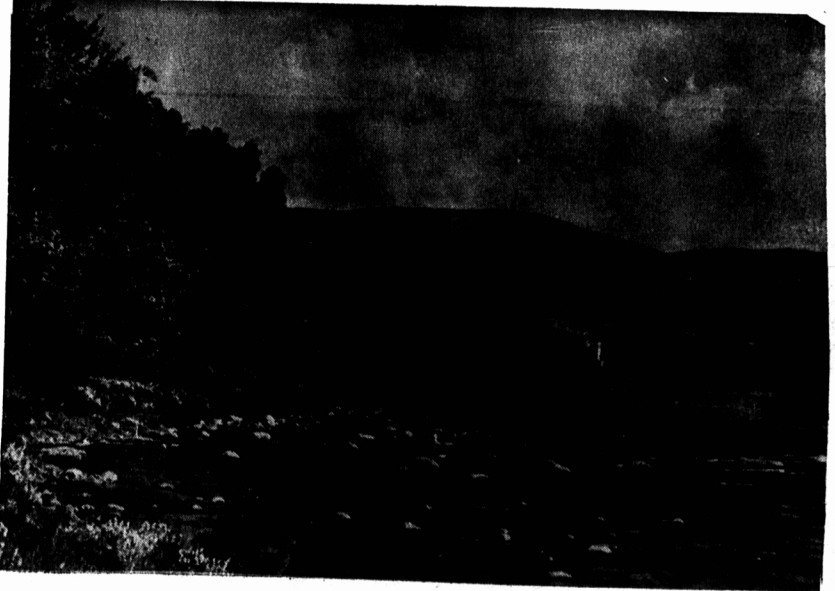

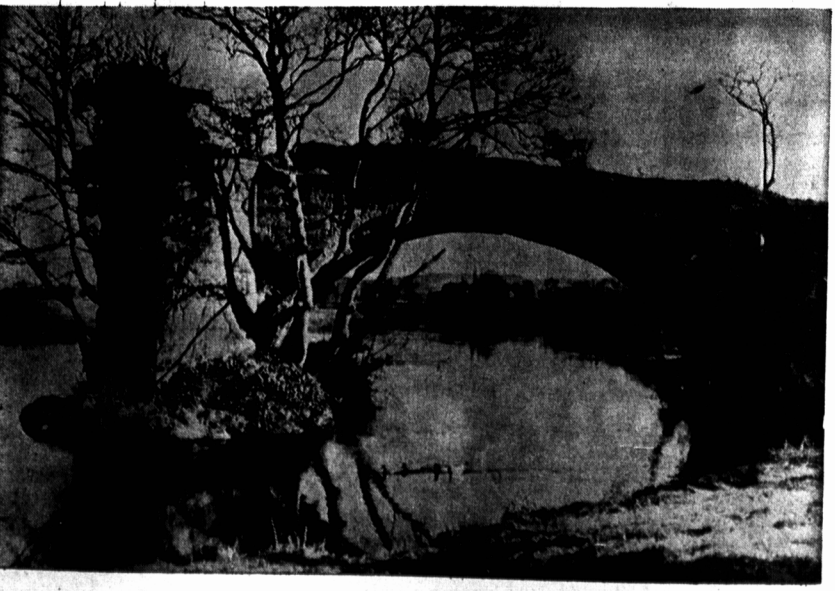
