

Canoe Cove Man Is Convicted

Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C., fined Harland Gordon Gaas, Canoe Cove, \$100 and costs or 15 days for impaired driving when he appeared in Magistrate's Court yesterday morning on a charge of impaired driving.

Wendell Myers, Mern a.s.d., pleaded not guilty to a charge of theft of a battery worth less than \$50 from Everett Hartin, Bethel. The case was adjourned by consent until December 14 for trial.

A plea of not guilty was claimed in the case of impaired driving against Edward Thomas Cook, Charlottetown, and the case was adjourned for trial on December 14.

Robert Joseph MacDonald and John Russell Dunn, City, were sentenced to 20 days each in Queens County Jail after they pleaded guilty to the theft of a motor vehicle from S.R. Johnston Ltd.

Michael Joseph Gallant, Shearwater, was fined \$25 and costs or 10 days for causing a public disturbance.

Eugene Joseph Shea, Lake Verde, pleaded guilty to a charge of public mischief on Halloween, and was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days.

The case of having sexual intercourse with a girl under 15 years of age, against John Joseph Thomas, Vernon Bridge, was adjourned until December 5 to allow the accused time to find a lawyer.

Summerside Resident Gets 1 Year In Dorchester

SUMMERSIDE — Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q.C., presided in Summerside town police court yesterday morning when Joseph Ivan Arsenault of Summerside pleaded guilty to a charge of break and enter with intent at W.D. Young, Insurance, 236 Water Street on November 4. He was given a one-year sentence in Dorchester Penitentiary, which will be served following his two-year term on break, enter, and theft, and possession of house breaking instruments, which he was given in Judge Darby's court this month.

Earlier in court yesterday morning, the accused had elected trial by magistrate.

Crown Prosecutor MacMahon stated that the accused had gained entry to the W. D. Young offices through the rear door and was found by police sitting in a chair in the office. Mr. MacMahon said the accused was reported in a high degree of intoxication.

Defence Counsel Neil R. MacLeod said that the accused reported he did not remember being in the office and he did not remember being arrested. There was nothing disturbed in the office, he said. He asked for a short term.

Magistrate Hinton said that he could see no grounds for leniency.

Wayne Clow of Summerside changed his plea to guilty in a charge of causing a disturbance at the vocational school, and was fined \$25 and costs. Magistrate Hinton said that in future such instances would result in a fine of \$50.

Chief Wannamaker told the court that he felt it ridiculous that a policeman has to be at a school dance to maintain law and order.

William E. Gaudet of Pleasant Hill was fined \$15 and costs on a charge of speeding, and Harford MacAusland of Summerside was fined \$30 and costs for driving without due care and attention.

Liquor Charges Dominate Docket

The majority of cases in the city police court yesterday morning were for violations of the liquor control act and for driv-

ing offences where liquor was involved.

Lloyd Stanley Livingston was fined \$125 or 30 days for impaired driving and Maurice Augustus Coady the same amount for drunken driving.

Magistrate A.J. Haslam, Q.C., also fined four offenders \$20 and costs or 30 days for illegal possession of liquor, one man \$20 and costs for being drunk and incapable and another \$25 and costs or 30 days for being drunk and disorderly.

Willard Murray Kennedy, city, was fined \$10 on a complaint that he was in a restaurant with his clothing open.

Dayid Augustine Power was fined \$15 and costs or five days for a speeding offence.

Stevedores Return To Work With No Increase

SUMMERSIDE — An unexpected strike ended by the Summerside stevedores on Friday evening and Saturday morning resulted in little or no pay increase, as men returned to their jobs.

Thane Ellis Ltd., agreed yesterday morning to pay the men \$1.65 an hour for loading the Mariella P. now docked at the Railway Wharf here, with potatoes from Thane Ellis Ltd., bound for Florida. The boat is expected to be completely loaded on Thursday.

Coastal Stevedoring Agencies Ltd., the other local stevedoring firm, has refused to consider any wage increase for this year.

Despite this fact, a full complement of men went back to work Saturday afternoon on the Elbeke, a ship chartered by Canada Packers for which Coastal Stevedoring is doing the stevedoring, at the previously established rate of \$1.50.

Two more potato boats have been waiting for some days to dock for loading here, and Coastal Stevedoring is the stevedoring agent for both these boats.

SAYS TOO LATE

James L. MacDougall, president of Coastal Stevedoring, said Sunday night that he would not negotiate wages at this time in the season, because all boats coming in this season have already been chartered, "with the present wage to stevedores borne in mind when we made our contracts. If the men wanted to negotiate, they should have done so before the boats had been chartered, when wage increases could possibly have been allowed for."

Mr. MacDougall said he would be willing to discuss next year's wages with representatives of the stevedores. He blamed this strike on a small group of agitators.

NO UNION

The local stevedores have no union organization and no elected or officially appointed representatives. Saturday morning they were asking \$2.00 an hour. They have been getting \$1.50 an hour since the settlement of a similar strike in October of 1964, previous to which they had been paid \$1.25.

The regular shifts are from eight to 12 in the morning, one to six o'clock in the afternoon and seven to 10 in the evening. They are paid the full \$1.50 for their hour off at suppers and get two coffee breaks, morning and afternoon, of 15 minutes each. Before the 1964 strike they were not paid for their supper hour.
