EMERGENCY FOOD SWINDLE.

The minority report of the committee appointed to enquire into the emergency ration charges reported:

(1) That under the circumstances disclosed by the evidences, the contract for the supply of emergency rations was entered into with undue and unnecessary haste by the Minister of Militia. Tenders were excluded, sufficient enquiry was not made, and the sample offered by the contractor was not properly examined.

(2) The emergency food supplied was totally unfit for the purpose intended, and an imposition was practiced on the department. The contractor is civilly liable to the government.

He violated the Criminal Code by offering an article bearing a false trade description.

(3) After the warning contained in the letter of the 25th of January last, quoted in the reference, and the report by Chief Analyst MacFarlane, the department of militia should have disallowed payment. The minister should have communicated with the Canadian contingent.

On the whole, your committee find that the minister of militia and the department of militia were guilty of culpable negligence in purchasing and providing Canadian soldiers with an article totally unfit for the purposes for which it was intended.

In this connection the committee recommend that the military authorities in South Africa be given immediately by cable the benefit of the report of the chief analyst.

Such is the report for which Mr. J. V. Ellis, of St. John, and several other supporters of the government voted.

The report of the government analyst above mentioned, says: "Since the average percentage of proteids in wheat is 12, it does not appear that this proteid powder is a very concentrated food, or is entitled to its name, or has a food value equivalent to \$2 per pound."

The St. John Sun remarks that the majority report, approving of the whole transaction, praising the minister of militia for his share in it, whitewashing contractor Devlin, and condemning Mr. Monk for bringing up the matter, was supported by Mr. Blair, Colonel Tucker, Colonel Domville and Mr. Costigan. Dr. Lewis either shirked the vote or paired in favor of the swindle. All these, with Sir Louis Davies and his two Island followers, Mr. Fielding, Mr. Logan and the whole Nova Scotia following of the government, supported the report which endorsed the fraud and condemned the honest and fearless French member who exposed it.

TURN OUT TARTE.

VOTE DOWN THE CANDIDATES WHO WILL, IF ELECTED, SUPPORT THE MASTER OF THE ADMINISTRATION.

REMARKING upon Mr. Fielding's promise that a mint shall be estab-

It is all very well for Sir Richard Cartwright talking for election purposes, to denounce tampering with the ballot, as he did in Goderich this week. The cold fact remains that the tactics of the Government of which Sir Richard was a member, were in part such as to prevent a thorough parliamentary enquiry into the ballot tampering around Goderich in the last election there.

WAR relics are now fetching a high price in London. At a recent sale complete sets of Mafeking siege stamps fetched from \$130 to \$175. A complete copy of the "Mafeking Mail," published during the siege, realized \$25, and an odd copy of the "Ladysmith Lyre" was knocked down at \$5. A specimen of the bread rations served as a "hot cross bun" at Mafeking on Good Friday, sold for \$30. No doubt the man who did without it thought it was well worth the money.

MR. JOHN CHARLTON says: "While holding that Canada is not likely to be able to get preferential treatment for her food products in the British market, I am free to confess that I may be mistaken in this view. It would have done no harm if a greater effort had been made to obtain from Great Britain some trade concessions in our favor. I shall urge the opening of negotiations with the home government for the purpose of obtaining, if possible, trade concessions from that nation which will put us in a more favorable position in her market than that enjoyed by foreign states."
